Introduction

♦ What is the Maidstone Local Board Area?

Until October 2008 there existed the KCC Maidstone Local Board. It was a forum for KCC County Council members to discuss key issues in Maidstone District and engage with local residents. There were at least four meetings a year held throughout the district at which the public were welcome. It was established to "put the Local into Government".

A new development across Kent in 2008 regarding Local Boards was the exploring of Localism with District Councils and the possibility of altering Local Boards or even developing new ideas to make them more effective. Essential was a closer collaboration between KCC and the Districts. Within Maidstone District this has resulted in numerous meetings between KCC members and officers and District councillors, and at present there is a agreed outline to organise in partnership with MBC four neighbourhood Fora that will include parish councils and statutory and volontary services. The geographical boundaries and membership of these are in Appendix 3. Negotiations are still taking place at the time of writing this report, April 2010 as to the exact method of operation.

Meetings

There have been no public meetings held during 2009/10, but the KCC members met on 15th October 2009 to agree the allotment of the Local Schemes and Small Community Capital Project grants.

⇒ Small Community Capital Grants

KCC allocated £500,000 in its Capital Budget for 2009/10 to the Small Community Capital Projects Fund. This was to be spent on small capital projects originating in local communities. The KCC Maidstone Local Board District was given £51,500 to allocate, and the total amount was distributed.

The job of the Local Board District was to receive applications to the Fund, and to recommend those they wished to support. The list of projects then went forward for Cabinet member approval. Applicants for projects were given guidance about how to submit their bid, and the criteria by which the Fund operates. KCC had identified four areas as particular priorities for the fund. These were:

- Projects which enhance local community and voluntary organisations in the provision of services to the public.
- Projects which enhance KCC's Supporting Independence Programme
- Projects which improve the provision of public transport
- Projects which improve the provision of community safety

The Fund's main eligibility criteria included the following:

- Grants could only be given to organisations that are 'properly constituted'. This includes organisations such as district, parish and town councils, voluntary and community groups, churches, societies, charities, etc. The organisation must be able to demonstrate that it is properly constituted.
- Grants could only be provided to a maximum value of £20,000 to any one project.
- Grants could only be provided to projects that enhance local communities or the provision of services to the public of Kent.

- Grants could not be provided as replacement funding.
- The grant support was for the purchase or creation of capital assets. It is not to fund current or on-going running costs.

⇒ Local Schemes Grants

Awards could be made for revenue projects or for minor capital schemes, and are all one-off grants with no reliance on funding for future years. Local Schemes Grants could be used with monies awarded from the Small Community Capital Grants but the two were not interchangeable. Local Schemes Grants could also be supplemented by awards under the Member Community Grant scheme.

The criteria for LSG awards were that they:

- Support KCC's "Towards 2010" strategy and /or
- Underpin the "Vision for Kent" and Public Service Agreement and/or
- Enhance KCC's Supporting Independence Programme

The amount available for Maidstone District was £13,400

8 grants totalling £13,400 were made by Kent County Council Maidstone Local Board at a meeting on 15^{th} October.


Member Community Grants







General information on grants from KCC Members and the Maidstone Local Board District

There are three different sorts of funding, the Members Community Grants (MCG) the Small Community Capital Project (SCCP) grants, and the Local Schemes (LS) grants.

The Members Community Grant monies are quite easy to apply for, with a minimum of form filling and waiting. Each KCC member has £10,000 a year to be spent in the financial year April to April. The money can be used for almost anything, providing it benefits the community and the member thinks it is a good idea. Decisions are made as applications are received and can be completed in as little as a week or two. It's better to approach the member first and discuss the idea with them, rather than just submit the application cold.

The best way to find *your* local member (and MP's and District Councillors) is go to http://democracy.kent.gov.uk/mgMemberIndex.aspx?bcr=1 Then, simply type in the postcode and you will get contact details.

Small Community Capital Project Grants are for up to £20,000 per application and each district has a set amount to spend related to the population. This effectively means approximately £40-50,000 per district, so usually large grants of around £20,000 don't tend to get handed out. These grants are meant to be for capital expenditure, not revenue, and they get a better reception if they are for part funding something in partnership than for the total cost. They take longer to get decided upon and paid out than member's grants, as they have to go before the KCC Members of Tonbridge and Malling District for recommendation, then to a Cabinet member for ratification. SCCP Grants are usually a once a year application round, normally paid out around December in any financial year. Local Schemes grants are similar to SCCP grants but can also be used for *revenue* funding as well as small capital purchases.

KCC Maidstone Local Board District and KCC Members funding 10/11

- Small Community Capital Grants- £51,400 are available.
- Local Schemes grants-£17,500 is available.

Deadline for applications for both these schemes is September 17th 2010 (although strongly recommended applications received before this to allow for site visits, alterations to application etc.)

KCC Members Community Grants- £90,000

Made up of 9 KCC members X £10,000

Deadline for final applications 28th February 2011 subject to

finance still being available.

Useful advice about Local Board and Members funding schemes:

- 1. Aside from Members grants, there will be no advantage in early application for the other grants. There will be a single cut off date for LS and SCCG application, **September 17th 2010**, and only one round of decisions based upon merit for each scheme. In fact, a hurried and possibly badly prepared application is likely to be detrimental.
- 2. "Getting an application in quick" to a member is no replacement for discussing it with the relevant member and getting a decision in principle. *Just because the project fulfils auditable requirements and criteria does not mean that a member would want to support it.*
- 3. The most successful applications are those where the applicant has discussed thoroughly with the relevant Community Liaison Manager their requirements, submitting it to the most relevant funding stream and then spent time on ensuring the application is legible, conforms to criteria and has the relevant documentation, approvals and signatures to back it up.
