LIST OF FORTHCOMING EXECUTIVE DECISIONS

Each week the list of Forthcoming Executive Decisions is updated where there are additions, deletions or amendments to be made. Although Kent County Council aims to include all known decisions, statute requires that all Key decisions must be publicised in this way.

A “Key Decision” is an Executive-side Decision which is likely to:

- (a) result in the council incurring expenditure which is, or the making of savings which are, significant having regard to the council’s budget for the service or function to which the decision relates; or
- (b) be significant in terms of its effects on communities living or working in an area comprising two or more electoral divisions in the area of the local authority.

Key Decisions can only be taken by the Cabinet, the Leader or an individual Cabinet Member.

Decisions which should be regarded as Key Decisions because they are likely to have a significant effect either in financial terms or on the Council’s services to the community include:

- (a) Decisions about expenditure or savings over £1,000,000
- (b) Adoption of major new policies not already included in the Policy Framework (Constitution Appendix 3) or changes to established policies
- (c) Approval of management and business plans
- (d) Decisions that involve significant service developments, significant service reductions, or significant changes in the way that services are delivered, whether County-wide or in a particular locality. For example, closure of a school, approval of a major project (such as a highway scheme) or programme of works, major changes in the eligibility criteria for provision of a service, major changes in the fees charged for a service, or proposals that would result in a service currently provided in-house being outsourced.
- (e) Decisions where the consequences are likely to result in compulsory redundancies or major changes in the terms and conditions of employment of a significant number of employees in any of the Council’s functions.

Preparation of the list helps the Council to programme its work and ensures compliance with the ‘Local Authorities (Executive Arrangements) (Meetings and Access to Information) (England) regulations 2012.

The list outlines the consultation that is proposed in respect of future decisions and who members of the public and the Council should contact to make comments on any particular item. Anyone is entitled to obtain copies of the documents that will be relied upon when a decision is taken, unless those documents are ‘Exempt’ within the meaning of the relevant sections of the Local Government Act 1972 (as amended).

Reports related to decisions will be published on the Council’s web site at www.kent.gov.uk at least five days before the decision it is due to be taken. Once the decision has been taken, a copy of the Record of Decision will also be published on the Council’s website.

Southfleet Road, Ebbsfleet: Growing Places Fund investment

A decision is required such that, subject to due diligence, Kent County Council shall agree to enter into credit agreements to secure investment from the Growing Places Fund to deliver improvements to Southfleet Road. This will help to unlock development at Eastern Quarry and provide access to the commercial development area at Station Quarter North.

Background

Growing Places Fund (GPF) is a Government scheme which provides loan finance to unlock development sites where these will create new jobs and homes. In the South East, the Fund is administered by the South East Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), for which Essex County Council acts as the accountable body.

Following a call for projects and appraisal, the LEP has given indicative approval to allocate up to £4 million to bring forward improvements to Southfleet Road.

In order to secure this funding, it is proposed that KCC will enter into:

- a) A credit agreement with Essex County Council to draw down the GPF funding; and
- b) A subsidiary credit agreement with Land Securities Eastern Quarry Ltd, who will deliver the scheme.

This shall be subject to final due diligence.

This Decision contributes to delivery of the following Delivering Bold Steps priorities:

- Priority 8: Respond to key regeneration challenges, working with our partners. This specifically prioritises actions to unlock key sites, where these will lead to jobs and housing
- Priority 9: Support new housing growth that is affordable, sustainable and with the appropriate infrastructure

Impact/costs and risks of proposed decision

Impact

The proposed Decision will mean that KCC will be able to draw down Growing Places Fund investment of up to £4 million. It is anticipated that this will unlock 1,500 homes at Eastern Quarry by 2020, and will also support the development of the Station Quarter North strategic employment site.

Risks

GPF funding is repayable. The primary risk is that KCC will be liable to repay the GPF loan to the Accountable Body, even if the private sector organisation is unable to repay the subordinate loan to KCC. This will be mitigated through due diligence, the robust drafting of the credit agreements, and project monitoring.

State Aid risks will be mitigated through the charging of an appropriate rate of interest, with all repayments (less costs to KCC) repaid to the GPF fund.

Costs

There will be some costs to KCC in managing the credit agreement. These will be recovered through interest payments and/ or through recharges to the central GPF fund, with costs and recovery mechanisms considered in development of the credit agreement.

Background

Growing Places Fund (GPF) is a Government scheme which provides loan finance to unlock development sites where these will create new jobs and homes. In the South East, the Fund is administered by the South East Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), for which Essex County Council acts as the accountable body.

Following a call for projects and appraisal, the LEP has given indicative approval to allocate up to £629,000 to bring forward a commercial site at Sturry Road, Canterbury.

In order to secure this funding, it is proposed that KCC will enter into:

- c) A credit agreement with Essex County Council to draw down the GPF funding; and
- d) A subsidiary credit agreement with the private sector owners of the development.

This shall be subject to final due diligence.

This Decision contributes to delivery of the following Delivering Bold Steps priorities:

- Priority 8: Respond to key regeneration challenges, working with our partners. This specifically prioritises actions to unlock key sites, where these will lead to jobs and housing

Impact/costs and risks of proposed decision

Impact

The proposed Decision will mean that KCC will be able to draw down Growing Places Fund investment of up to £629,000. It is anticipated that this will unlock 4,000 sq m commercial floorspace and facilitate the creation of 40 jobs (gross) by 2015.

Risks

GPF funding is repayable. The primary risk is that KCC will be liable to repay the GPF loan to the Accountable Body, even if the private sector organisation is unable to repay the subordinate loan to KCC. This will be mitigated through due diligence, the robust drafting of the credit agreements, and project monitoring.

State Aid risks will be mitigated through the charging of an appropriate rate of interest, with all repayments (less costs to KCC) repaid to the GPF fund.

Costs

There will be some costs to KCC in managing the credit agreement. These will be recovered through interest payments and/ or through recharges to the central GPF fund, with costs and recovery mechanisms considered in development of the credit agreement.

The Base, Phase 2, Dartford. Growing Places Fund investment

Background

Growing Places Fund (GPF) is a Government scheme which provides loan finance to unlock development sites where these will create new jobs and homes. In the South East, the Fund is administered by the South East Local Enterprise Partnership (LEP), for which Essex County Council acts as the accountable body.

Following a call for projects and appraisal, the LEP has given indicative approval to allocate up to £2.95 million to deliver Phase 2 of The Base.

In order to secure this funding, it is proposed that KCC will enter into a credit agreement with Essex County Council to draw down the GPF funding.

In addition, KCC will enter into an agreement with the Homes and Communities Agency, which owns the freehold of the site, to enable the development to proceed.

This shall be subject to final due diligence.

This Decision contributes to delivery of the following Delivering Bold Steps priorities:

- Priority 8: Respond to key regeneration challenges, working with our partners. This specifically prioritises actions to unlock key sites, where these will lead to jobs and housing

Impact/costs and risks of proposed decision

Impact

The proposed Decision will mean that KCC will be able to draw down Growing Places Fund investment of up to £2.95 million. It is anticipated that this will deliver 108 jobs (gross).

Risks

GPF funding is repayable. Member Highway Fund Scheme - Review

The MHF scheme allows Members to fund highway schemes that have been directly promoted by local communities which would not normally be funded by KCC. This is a fundamental part of putting the citizen control in accordance Bold Steps for Kent.

Bold Steps for Kent also aims to drive economic prosperity, partly by delivering the priorities set out in our integrated transport strategy *Growth Without Gridlock (GWG)*. One such priority of GWG is road safety and many of the schemes already implemented as part of the MHF scheme have tackled local road safety concerns.

Member satisfaction with the MHF process was reported to have fallen in the last H&T tracker survey, with some Members feeling that the process was too slow and bureaucratic. In addition, staff had spent a disproportionate amount of time designing and promoting schemes which were not then taken forward to construction. This review seeks to directly address these issues by suggesting ways in which bureaucracy can be reduced and scheme delivery speeded up.

To seek agreement for the restack and refurbishment of Invicta House as part of the New Ways of Working roll-out programme, part of the 'Doing Things Differently' business transformation agenda.

The works respond directly to and are a key part of the 'Doing Things Differently' business transformation agenda, currently being undertaken by KCC in response to 'Facing the Challenge', a proposed restructuring of how the Council undertakes its business in order to reduce the cost of local government and council expenditure generally.

Additionally the overall programme of works contributes to 'Building stronger relationships with key business sectors across Kent' as Kent based businesses are being engaged to undertake the refurbishment works on KCC's behalf; it responds to 'key regeneration challenges and working with our partners', specifically where it releases previously leased property back into the business community, allowing new businesses to take up the opportunity to expand and develop in Kent or where deals can be done with partners / developers that enable former KCC land to be redeveloped to provide community facilities, such as Schools or similar. As retained buildings are restacked to provide refreshed workplaces for increased densities of KCC staff, the greater utilisation of fewer buildings resulting in a decrease in energy costs, business rates and maintenance costs, responds directly to the 'Kent Environment Strategy'.

Financial Implications: A budget has been included and approved in the Medium Term Plan. If this project does not progress, the Council will be unable to exit its leasehold properties.

Legal Implications: The building is wholly owned by KCC but planning approval might be necessary dependent upon the level of external change required to address accessibility and any additional or new building services plant, required to cope with the increased population of the building. Works will also be subject to building control.

Equality Implications: An 'Equality, Inclusion and Access' (EqIA) assessment has been undertaken for the programme and will be updated as appropriate.

Single Source / Non-Complaint Justification for Kent's eight Commissioned Children's Centres
To seek agreement to continue existing arrangements for a year through a Single tender Action or other form of Agreement to allow time for development of the 0-11 strategy.
Kent County Council currently commissions seven organisations to deliver eight Children's Centres in Kent. Arrangements with these current providers take a variety of forms including contracts, grant agreements and service level agreements. All contracts have been extended on a rolling basis for a minimum of the last two financial years. Existing arrangements are due to end on 31st March 2014.
The Kent Children's Centres programme is currently undergoing a Future Service Options review. The public consultation ended on 4th October and a decision on the future of the service is expected in December 2013 with an implementation from April 2014.

In order to fully consider the implications of Facing the Challenge, the whole Council Transformation Plan, the development of a 0-11 children's strategy and Kent's approach to wider scale commissioning, it is recommended that a single tender action is taken to maintain service delivery from current service providers for one year from 1st April 2014 – 31st March 2015.

Renewing the contract through a single source would provide the flexibility for the Council to consider the full portfolio of Children's Centres as part of the wider Transformation programme and fully assess the implications of the integrated 0-11 strategy, ensuring Children's Centre services were embedded within this.

The next year will be one of significant change management for services which may incur costs. Procuring for one year contract is likely to deter many providers. Tendering now would also limit the potential for savings by reducing the scope for making economies of scale as the Centres are spread geographically across the county and may not attract bids from the widest range of providers.

The current seven Children's Centre providers are trusted, locally established, community integrated providers of services for 0-5 years olds and their families. Renewing their current contracts through a single source would ensure continuity of provision for children and their families through what will be a wider period of transition for services and Children's Centres in particular.

Of the eight Children's Centres that are currently commissioned, five of the buildings are owned by the service providers. If these providers were not successful through a competitive procurement process, the Children's Centre accommodation may have to change. Renewing the contract through a single source would ensure continuity of provision from the same location.

It would also offer the opportunity for officers to negotiate savings and pilot a revised service specification for the current eight Children's Centres and ensure centres were focused in line with the revised Ofsted framework, statutory guidance and ensure there is a strong concentration on outreach and supporting the most vulnerable families.
