Brief description of policy, procedure, project or service

The current Highways Rural Swathe, Visibility and Hedge Cutting Contract is due to end on the 31 March 2022. The Council has implemented Plan Bee as part of its environmental strategy to improve the biodiversity across its assets. There is an opportunity at this point to revise the specifications to address this strategy and improve the biodiversity of these assets.

The current one swathe cut regime although appropriate for safety does not deliver on biodiversity. Two swathe cuts present a more sustainable approach to delivering Plan Bee aspirations and will be more beneficial to the environment.

Aims and Objectives

Increasing the biodiversity content of the Highway Rural Swathe, Visibility and Hedge Cutting Maintenance Contracts is required to meet the Councils commitments on its Pollinator Strategy. This needs to be achieved whilst also meeting its 'Duty of Care' to highway users and complying with the Highways Act 1980.

It contributes to KCC's strategic objectives through:

- Delivering the Kent Environment Strategy and develop effective climate mitigation strategies and plans.
- Customer satisfaction by providing 'the right services in the right way for the right people'

Adverse Impact,

The adverse effects are the lack of maintenance of the asset and this will affect the whole population. Overgrown vegetation can adversely impact age and disability more through access issues or visibility problems. These will be taken into account on a needs basis

Positive Impact:

The positive effects of maintaining the asset for greater biodiversity impact the whole population. Locally it may have a greater impact on age or disability, but this will only be identified at the time. There is strong evidence that increased biodiversity supports greater well being.
