
Homes for Ukraine Update Cabinet 21.04.22

Recap of the Schemes:

- Family Scheme (managed by Home Office).
- Homes for Ukraine Sponsorship Scheme (Home Office Visa application and matches/ Local Authority Obligations at a local level).
- No funding available for guests under the family scheme, £10.5k for each guest under the sponsorship scheme, plus education contribution and 'Thank you' sponsor payments.

The data as at 19.04.22:



Local Authority five checks:

- Ascertain the sponsoring address exists and can be used as residential accommodation.
- Visit the address and assess it is suitable to accommodate the proposed guests.
- Initiate DBS checks (basic for over-16's, enhanced if guests include children or vulnerable adults).
- Confirm that the guests have arrived at the accommodation.
- Complete welfare checks and visit the guests to confirm there are no serious concerns.

<u>Check</u> Progress

- DBS Checks being undertaken by KCC, as of the end of last week, 1100 applications in the system, 800 at ID verification, 400 with DBS and 224 returned.
- KCC Home checks checklist agreed by KHOs and being delivered locally (Part B deals with safeguarding). As at the end of last week, 325 completed checks.
- Mixed approach to welfare support (9 x KCC providers, 2 x district, 1 x hybrid). Referrals being made.
- Districts engaging with local VCS to deliver wraparound support and signpost.
- #KentTogether 24/7 phoneline up and running and welcome packs available.
- Systemised App to manage data flows is in test to enable work flow across the system.

Payments

- KCC managing £350pcm 'thank you payments' to hosts (workflow being developed).
- £200 per individual payments being made through KSAS/ Paypoint – first payment runs made last week.
- Options being scoped to replace KSAS/ Paypoint in the longer term.

Access to local services

- Access to schools via KCC website and normal application process.
- Linking in with NHS but access via GPs.
- DWP working on UC (talking to banks to resolve issues on bank accounts) and a Kent triage system being established.

Key areas of focus/ risks raised with central government

- Data (quality and amount of information).
- Lack of oversight of/ insight into Family Scheme.
- Lack of funding associated with Family Scheme.
- Housing pressures and ability to house guests when matches fail or checks fail particularly when guests are already in situ.
- Ambiguity over application of safeguarding legislation.
- Volume of successful matches and ability of public services to cope (for example education, mental health, social services etc..)
- · Community tensions.
