Kent County Council currently purchase two separate services, namely, an Accommodation Service for Older Children in Care and Care Leavers Aged 16-21 (known as 'KCC Shared Accommodation'.) and the Young People Supported Accommodation and Floating Support (YPSAFS) service. These services are delivered by different organisations on behalf of KCC. The contracts for both services are due to end on the 31 March 2023.

The Council is working to redesign and align the accommodation and support pathway for Care Leavers, Children in Care and Children in Need 16- and 17-year-olds. This includes purchasing a good range of stable,

safe, and well-maintained accommodation and support services that are flexible to meet individual and changing demands. The specifications for the proposed new services and pathway and is currently being developed with key stakeholders.

The aim of the activity is to commission adequate accommodation ensuring equal access to all eligible children and young people and that there are no restrictions based on protected characteristics. The process will include stakeholder engagement including consultation with children and young people, to produce a new operating model for an Unregulated Accommodation and Support Pathway prior to going out to procurement.

The development of an Unregulated Accommodation and Support Pathway through the recommissioning of both the Shared Accommodation service and YPSAFS service through a joint procurement will offer the opportunity to build on lessons learnt from the previous contracts and improve the overall service offering.

The aim of the activity is to ensure service users are accessing safe, secure, and well-maintained accommodation at the correct price point for KCC. Service users will benefit from an improved service that offers a defined step-down pathway to assist young people to achieve full independence.

The recommissioning of Shared Transitional Accommodation and YPSAFS Service will ensure that we shape the service around the wants and needs of children and young people with a focus on long term impact and achieving positive outcomes whilst also ensuring that resources are used effectively across the whole service pathway.

b) Details of Negative Impacts for Age	<p>This commissioning exercise will affect 16–25-year-olds Children in Care and Care Leavers as well as 16-17 Children in Need. Any changes will apply to these cohorts only.</p> <p>There are currently 75 young people (13%) over 21 within Shared, and 13 young people in YPSAFS (8%).</p> <p>The Shared Accommodation service predominantly accommodates UASC new arrivals, as well as accommodating citizen 16/17-year-old Children in Care and 18+ citizen Care Leavers. Current ratio is 90% non-citizen, 10% citizen.</p> <p>The number of 16/17 year olds has decreased from 107 (March 2021) to 75 (March 2022) due to the implementation of the National Transfer Scheme where KCC are now capped to accept 242 UASC.</p> <p>The majority of 18+ service users are former UASC that</p>

	<p>have aged through this provision.</p> <p>It is proposed that the new service will include the delivery of transitional outreach support into shared for new placements in response to feedback from practitioners and service users. This will have a positive impact as Service Users are supported in developing their independent living skills and settling within the local community.</p>

b) Details of Negative Impacts for Pregnancy and Maternity	<p>Size of accommodation available within the YPSAFS service does not always allow for appropriate space required by Parents and Child.</p> <p>Partners are often not able to stay with the parent due to house rules/ size of accommodation/ previous history.</p> <p>If the child is a Looked After Child, then the Parent and Child are no longer eligible for the service due to YPSAFS being unregulated. Support offered is only for the Parent.</p> <p>The YPSAFS service does not adversely impact on pregnancy and maternity however, health assessments are completed on all children up to the age of 18 on a yearly basis. Those identified as pregnant will be identified and any additional support accessed.</p> <p>Shared transitional accommodation properties facilitate parent and child, where the child is not under Social Services (i.e., a Child in Care).</p>
