Kent County Council currently purchase two separate services, namely, an Accommodation Service for Older				
Children in Care and Care Leavers Aged 16-21 (known as 'KCC Shared Accommodation'.) and the Young				
People Supported Accommodation and Floating Support (YPSAFS) service. These services are delivered by				
different organisations on behalf of KCC. The contracts for both services are due to end on the 31 March				
2023.	2023.			

The Council is working to redesign and align the accommodation and support pathway for Care Leavers, Children in Care and Children in Need 16- and 17-year-olds. This includes purchasing a good range of stable, safe, and well-maintained accommodation and support services that are flexible to meet individual and changing demands. The specifications for the proposed new services and pathway and is currently being developed with key stakeholders.

The aim of the activity is to commission adequate accommodation ensuring equal access to all eligible children and young people and that there are no restrictions based on protected characteristics. The process will include stakeholder engagement including consultation with children and young people, to produce a new operating model for an Unregulated Accommodation and Support Pathway prior to going out to procurement.
