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














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



The children in low income families (CiLIF) statistics provide information on the number and proportion of children living in Relative and Absolute low income before housing costs (BHC) in the reference year. A family must have claimed one or more of Universal Credit, Tax Credits or Housing Benefit at any point in the year to be classed as low income in these statistics.

In 2021/22, <u>1,900</u> children aged 0-5 lived in a relative low-income family in <u>Maidstone</u>, which is <u>15.2%</u> of the 0-5 population in the district. The rate for Kent is <u>16.4%</u>.

There were 570 children aged 0-5 in Maidstone with an Early Help (EH) case in 2021/22, which is a rate of 4.5% of the 0-5 population in the district. This is lower than the Kent rate of 4.8%.

There were 544 children aged 0-5 in Maidstone with a social care care or referral in 2021/22, which is a rate of 4.3% of the 0-5 population in the district. This is lower than the Kent rate of 4.9%.



Maidstone: Health Visitor Performance


Proportion of health visits or checks completed within target time in 2021/22, compared to the Kent rate (turquoise line).

Healthy Child Clinic rates

There were <u>365</u> Healthy Child Clinics held in <u>Maidstone</u> in 2021/22. This means that there were 1 clinic held for every 5.4 children aged under 1-years-old*.

This is a lower rate compared to Kent overall (1 clinic held for every <u>2.9</u> children aged under 1-years-old).

Breastfeeding Groups rates

There were 235 Breastfeeding Groups held in Maidstone in 2021/22. This means that there were 1 group held for every 8.4 children aged under 1-years-old*.



Maidstone: Visits to Children Centres



In the 2021/22 academic year, children centres had visits from 952 children aged 0-5 who lived in Maidstone, which is rate of 7.6% of the 0-5 population in the district. This is lower than the Kent rate of 10.1%.

In total, there were 3,799 visits to children centers in 2021/22 from children aged 0-5 who lived in Maidstone.




Maidstone: Take-up of Free Early Education by 3 & 4 Year Olds

Free Early Education (FEE)




Universal entitlement

All 3 and 4 year olds are entitled to up to 15 hours of free childcare each week for 38 weeks a year, or fewer hours per week over more weeks of a year (up to 570 hours).



In <u>Maidstone</u> in the summer term 2022, <u>53.0%</u> of 3 and 4 year olds had taken up Free Early Education (FEE) and <u>40.6%</u> had taken up Extended Funded Entitlement (EFE). Overall take-up was 93.6%.

In comparison, for Kent the take-up rates were $\underline{87.5\%}$ overall, 53.0% for FEE and 34.6% for EFE.



Eligible 3 and 4 year olds can receive an extra 15 hours of free childcare each week. Eligibility depends on:

- parent(s) working status
- parent(s) income
- child's age and circumstances
- parent(s) immigration status

Please note that the data does not include children taking up childcare in neighbouring authorities, so take up rates in Dartford and Sevenoaks will be higher than shown in this report.

1.2% of 0-5 year olds in Maidstone have an EHCP. The rate for Kent is 1.2%.

The most common need type among 0-5 year olds in Maidstone is Speech, Language and Communication Needs (44.2%).

The EHCP data includes all children aged 0-5 on 31 August 2021. The rates have been calculated using the 2021 ONS mid-year estimate population figures.

Of the <u>2,075</u> children assessed in <u>Maidstone</u>, <u>66.3%</u> of Year R pupils achieved a Good Level of Development in the Early Years Foundation Stage (EYFS) profile in the 2022 assessment.

This is higher than the Kent rate of 65.4%.
