The Department for Education (DfE) published Stable Homes, Built on Love – an Implementation strategy and consultation on 2 February 2023, the consultation was backed by £200m additional investment. The Stable Homes, Built on Love strategy sets out a vision to re-balance children's social care away from costly crisis intervention to more meaningful and effective early support. It sets out actions that seek to:

- Address urgent issues facing children and families now
- Lay the foundations for whole system reform
- Set national direction for change

The Families First for Children (FFC) Pathfinder is a core commitment made in the strategy. Kent County Council submitted an application to become a FFC Pathfinder through Wave 2 of the programme on 6 November 2023 with support from the Assistant Chief Constable and the Director of Children's Services in the Kent and Medway Integrated Care Board. This is in recognition that becoming a FFC Pathfinder will require greater integration and system level reform of services to transform the multi-agency safeguarding arrangements, Family Help, Child Protection and Family Networks. The key features of this programme include:

- Establishing a system-wide, 'Families First' culture, which addresses structural inequalities, attends to the full spectrum of families' contexts and needs, and facilitates a welcoming and effective system for children and families.
- Clarifying and strengthening multi-agency safeguarding arrangements, ways of working and independent scrutiny. This includes strengthening the role of education in multi-agency safeguarding arrangements at strategic level.
- Streamlining and supporting effective multi-agency information sharing and case management systems.

Services to be offered through the Families First for Children will change from the current services, with co-location of a wider range of services with a focus on improved accessibility to services for children and young people and their parents / carers. This will be an important change for service users which may have equalities impacts.

To support the delivery of these changes and the development of the new service offer, if successful in the bid, KCC will receive from the Department for Education (DfE) a one-off grant of £5m for one year funding in 2024/25. The grant is to support system transformation through workforce development and supporting development of new services.

How will the proposed model affect wider users?

- Teams will be integrated to become multi-disciplinary for Family Help Services and multi-agency for the Child Protection Service with both services having access to Family Group Conferences integrated into the services. The new teams will be operating from the current KCC offices, and these are the offices that children, young people and families are already accessing and therefore there will be minimal disruption. There will be clear communication detailing where families can access services in each of the districts.
- Service users should no longer need to explain their situation repeatedly to different professionals as we will integrate our working practices to better capture families' stories once. The use of the Family Help Assessment means families can access either early help or statutory services following one assessment
- Service users will have access to a greater range of digital and online information to support their role as parents and this will compliment services already offered through the Family Hubs
- Service users will not just be a recipient of service. Families First for Children 'culture' means we will work alongside families to ensure that they receive the service that meets their need
- Parents of young people will be able to access a wider range of information and support for adolescents including Family Group Conferences at an early stage to build on the family networks.

Recommendations

We anticipate that the overall impact of Families First for Children will be positive for children, young people, and families, including those with protected characteristics who access the relevant services. This is likely to include children and young people with SEND, those with children and young people with disabilities, those from ethnically diverse communities as well as those with lower household incomes.

We expect to see positive outcomes for children, young people, and families such as:

- An increase in the use of family group conferencing at the early stages of our intervention which will enhance family networks to support children and young people in the community
- Improved access to other services including substance misuse services, domestic abuse support and children and adult mental health services as these services will be part of the multi-disciplinary and multi-agency teams

Disability

Kent has a higher proportion of people aged under 16 (5.8%) claiming a disability benefit than both the regional (4.5%) and national average (4.6%). It is unknown how many children with SEN, or a disability, use current services, as this information is not routinely collected. Through the new Family Help Service, there will be a close link with the Strengthening Independence Service as well as SEND to ensure that all children irrespective of their additional needs, receive a service.

Through taking a whole family approach, and the co-location of services, parents, and carers of children with disabilities will not have to tell their story more than once.

Through more integrated working which is key to the Families First for Children model, parents and carers should be better supported to seek and receive help through the practitioners who will be part of the Family Help Services and the Multi-Agency Child Protection Services.

Religion

There is currently no direct data which measures religion of children and young people or parents of children and young people living in Kent. The only data collected is related to the overall population and based on the 2021 Census data. The Council provides services to children, young people, and their families, irrespective of their religion or beliefs.

Race

Ethnicity varies across the districts in Kent. Gravesham and Dartford have the highest proportion of ethnically diverse profiles. Approximately a third of 0–4-year-olds in Gravesham and a quarter of Dartford district are non-white British.

According to the 2021 Census, there are a total of 7,660 people living in Kent from one of the Gypsy, Roma or Traveller communities. There is likely to be under-recording as people may be reluctant to self-identify for fear of discrimination

and mistrust of organisations and authorities. Gypsy, Roma, Traveller communities have higher rates of mortality, morbidity and long-term health conditions, low child immunisation and a higher prevalence of anxiety and depression compared with the general population. This highlights the importance of acknowledging the increased likelihood of inequalities, and likely barriers to accessing services. Work will be done to offer training and support to staff around specific cultural competences to enable staff to effectively engage children from all the different communities.

Sexual orientation/ Gender identity/ Transgender

Our services are open to all individuals, but we recognise that accessing services can be challenging. Our workforce development will support inclusive practice and whole family working with a commitment to equality.

Wider impact

KCC if successful will receive a grant of just under £5m to transform our services. The grant is in place to support system transformation through service integration, workforce development, and co-designed new services as directed by the DfE. Being part of the Wave 2 Pathfinder means KCC can influence future service design for children services.

The co-location of staff in buildings will make services easier to access and reduce the need for service users to tell their story more than once.

The integrated working model would ensure that staff working under the Families First for Children umbrella would all adopt the whole family model and have access to workforce development opportunities. This means that families would receive a more consistent style and quality of service.

The new model also includes partnerships with other agencies and voluntary service. This will enable improved access to a wider range of services for children, young people and parents/carers.
