Member's Community Grant

KCC has found a great way to help fund local community groups and organisations without fuss or too much bureaucracy. Every year, each KCC Member may allocate £10,000 to worthwhile causes within their community.

Here's how Michael spent his last year:

Age Concern – money towards employing a volunteer recruiter for the service – £2,500

Canterbury Active Retirement Association – a planned coach trip for the group - £1,000

Littlebourne Afternoon Club – a mystery coach tour for its members - £325
East Kent Rape Line – a project focusing on male rape - £1,000
Spring Lane Community Centre – coach costs for local residents - £250
Workers of Art – to stage a 'secrets and dreams' event in the City - £300
Conrad Hall, Bishopsbourne – kitchen upgrade for the hall - £2,151
Canterbury Sea Cadets – the purchase of a training vessel - £1,000
Simon Langton Girls' School – doing up a car to take part in a rally - £260
The Lighthouse Project – continuing to provide support for vulnerable people - £1,184

Allowances

Each Member of KCC receives a basic allowance (salary) to compensate them for the time spent on their duties and to meet many of the day-to-day expenses of being a Councillor.

Some Members also receive a Special Responsibility Allowance (SRA) when they take on extra duties such as serving as a member of the Cabinet, Leader of the Opposition or Chairman of a committee.

County Councillors can only claim the usual expenses that most businesses would pay for.

These are for actual costs for example reimbursement for fuel and travel which they have incurred whilst carrying out their duties as County Councillor.

<u>View Members allowances and</u> expenses

Member's Highway Fund

KCC recognises that local Members are well placed to decide which small transport and highways schemes would be most useful to their communities. That's why each Member is allocated £25,000 to spend on local schemes. It's called the Members Highway Fund and here's how it was spent last year...

Bekesbourne Road, Bekesbourne – improved signage and clearing of vegetation - £7,500 A257 Wingham & Littlebourne – Change in speed limit - £6,608 Maintenance provision for 2 weeks in the division - £7,500

My achievements this year, and ambitions for next year

Canterbury South East is about half urban, have rural. It covers much of south Canterbury and swings east to Grove Ferry and south to Breach near Barham. It is a wonderful division and includes a world heritage site, vineyard, wildlife park, county cricket ground, the oldest parish church in England, four secondary schools, business parks and ancient villages where Ian Fleming wrote about Bond and Henry Moore sculpted.

My main ambition is to continue to help local people as much as possible over such a wide area with its varied range of issues. The best part is when, for example, I have been able to help people get the right school for their child, or ensure road improvements, or find funding for valuable local projects.

I attend numerous County Hall meetings and have served on most committees. I am currently on the Communities Committee and am Chairman of the local Joint Transportation Board.
