In April 2013 the new Kentand Medway IDVA Service was commissioned to work with domestic abuse victims, specifically supp orting the work of Multi-Agency Risk Assessment Conferences (MARACs) and the Specialist Domestic Violence Courts (SDVCs) across Kentand Me dway, with the aim of reducing the harmful effects domestic abuse has on its victims.

5 UnderstandingDomesticAbuse

Whilst some agencies, including central government term 'domestic violence' others prefer to use 'dome stic abuse,' both terms coverallformsofdomestic violence and abuse.

For the purpose of this Strategy, the following def inition of domestic abuse applies:

HomeOfficeDefinition2013:

Anyincidentorpatternofincidentsofcontrolling ,coerciveorthreatening behaviour,violenceorabusebetweenthoseaged16 oroverwhoareorhave beenintimatepartnersorfamilymembersregardless ofgenderorsexuality.

This can encompass, but is not limited to, the foll owing types of abuse:

- psychological
- physical
- sexual
- financial
- emotional

Controllingbehaviouris: arangeofactsdesignedtomakeaperson subordinateand/ordependentbyisolatingthemfrom sourcesofsupport, exploitingtheirresourcesandcapacitiesforperso nalgain,deprivingthemof themeansneededforindependence,resistanceande scapeandregulating theireverydaybehaviour.

Coercivebehaviouris: anactorapatternofactsofassault,threats, humiliationandintimidationorotherabusethatis usedtoharm,punish,or frightentheirvictim.

Thisdefinition, which is not a legal definition, includes so called 'honour' based violence, female genital mutilation (FGM) and forced marriage, and is clear that victims are not confined to one gender or rethnic group.

Itisalsoimportanttorememberthatmostresearch also suggests that domestic violence occursinal lisections of society irrespective of gender, race, culture, nationality, religion, sexuality, disabili ty, age, classoreducational level.

6 AimsoftheKMDASG

The KMDASG aims to reduce domestic abuse and change attitudes by increasing knowledge and understanding of the impace to f domestic abuse across communities and agencies highlighting the fact that it is everyone's responsibilitytotackledomesticabusewhilstemph asisingtheeffectivenessof earlyidentification and intervention.



Ofthe1259visitorswhocametotheonestopshops ,86%reportedthatthey hadfoundtheirvisithelpful,0%(number=4,percen tageisroundedtherefore notstatisticallysignificant)reportedtheirvisit hadnotbeenhelpfuland14% didnotrecordaresponsetothisquestion.

Afewoftheonestopshopsreport100%ofvisitors servicehelpful,howeversomeothersstillhavesig visitorswhosefeedbackontheserviceisnotbeing figureshaveimprovedwhencomparedtotheprevious recordaresponsetothisquestion.

UsingthistoolitisestimatedthatacrossKentan dMedway:

53,953womenandgirlsaged15–59havebeenavictimof **domesticabuse** inthepastyear.

27,392womenandgirlsaged15–59havebeenavictimof a **sexualassault** inthepastyear.

66,902womenandgirlsaged15–59havebeenavictimof **stalking**inthe pastyear

ThetotalcosttoKentandMedwayservicesindeali ngwiththeeffectsof domesticabuseandsexualassault= £317,125,587.2

Howeverthistoolislimitedinthatitwasonlyde signedtousedatatoestimate thenumberoffemalevictimsofdomesticabuseand sexualassault.With malevictimsaccountingforapproximately18%ofdo mesticincidentsreported toKentPoliceitisimportanttorecognisethatth eactualfigureforthetotal numberofvictimsofdomesticabuseacrossKentand Medwaywillbe significantlyhigherthanthetotalsestimatedabov e.
