Medium

The development of the Hub will provide a number of enhancements to Southborough which includes the KCC Library, GP surgery, Southborough Town Council, Hall/Theatre, football pavilion, community rooms and café. It will provide better access to public services for all sectors of the community. The project will deliver a greater mix of services in one location to meet the needs of the local community.

The scheme went out for public consultation (30 November 2015 for 8 weeks) on two options being taken forward. Option 1 new build and option 2 part retain and refurbish. The majority of respondents supported option 1 and feedback was also sort on the EQUIA as part of the consultation. STC and the Southborough Hub Board have agreed to pursue option 1 new build. This is now progressing with the project now at the detailed design stage.

Context

Southborough Community Hub is an exciting project designed to integrate public service provision to meet the needs of a diverse and growing community.

The Key partners on the development are;

- Libraries, Registration & Archives (KCC)
- Southborough Town Council
- Tunbridge Wells Borough Council
- St Andrew's Medical centre
- Ridgewaye Football Club

The proposed services in the hub are proposed as;

- Southborough Library
- Southborough town council services
- Hall/Theatre
- Community facilities available for rent to all, helping to attract other public and voluntary community services
- Café
- Adjoining medical centre
- Football pavilion on an adjacent site
- Town square

Housing development

The project is driven by a shared objective to regenerate the town centre of Southborough by improving facilities and access to local public services for all, offering high quality customer care and exploiting the potential offered by joint working. Customer access will be developed to ensure equal access for all services including providing meeting spaces which can accommodate family requirements and wheelchair access for customers living with a disability.

Central to this vision is the desire to create an attractive, modern customer focused environment with a range of integrated facilities. The aim is to make the facility a community hub for everyone which will act as a focal point for the town and provide a large community space at the heart of Southborough. It will endeavour to provide a wide range of community organisations with the facilities they need and ensure that customers receive a seamless service that leads to increased use of all services in the building and high levels of customer satisfaction.

Delivery of the Southborough Hub

The Project is consistent with TWBC strategic policy in the following ways:

The Borough Council's mission for Our Five Year Plan is to be an enabler of change, encouraging economic growth and investment into the Borough whilst ensuring the appropriate infrastructure is in place to support growth and enhance quality of life". The Southborough Hub project falls broadly within the 'Confident Borough' theme, which identifies that; 'By 2019, the Borough will have worked alongside Parish and Town Councils and voluntary and community organisations to deliver a range of community facilities and to support them in delivering a range of services and events'. Southborough is identified as a key settlement. The vision document confirming that TWBC is keen to work with partners to develop proposals for housing, retail, employment, tourism and community facilities as well as supporting infrastructure.

Aims and Objectives

The Hub will support community activity through the following objectives:

- To bring forward a top quality facility which is energy efficient, meets equality standards, fit for purpose and is highly visible and recognisable to the local community;
- To provide customers with seamless service enabling them to carry out multiple transactions from one location;
- Deliver savings via service modernisation;
- Look to minimise facility revenue costs through a more efficient building;
- To deliver on asset collaboration with a number of public sector organisations;
- Provide partners with an enhanced flexible, long-term community asset able to facilitate numerous forms of service delivery;
- Improve access to a wide range of services from a variety of partners;

Beneficiaries

The main beneficiary of the new Hub would be local residents, who would be provided the opportunity to access a wide range of public and third sector partners.

Other beneficiaries include:

- Residents of Kent
- Visitors to Southborough
- All services & partners involved in the project

Consultation and data

In order to raise the profile of the project a pre-engagement questionnaire was undertaken on the 20 May and closed on the 23 June 2015. The questionnaire looked to inform the design and development of the project. The outcome of this report has already been shared with Kent County Council's design and planning consultants so that appropriate measures can be taken into the design, planning application and operational model.


Architects have since worked up two options for the site in more detail and designs were presented to the public as part of a consultation in late 2015 early 2016. Option two had a part refurb part new build of the current Royal Victoria Hall with option one being a complete new build. The final outcome saw Southborough and High Brooms residents voting overwhelmingly for option one new build and STC and the Southborough Hub Board then endorsed this position. The architect did not identify anything relating to equality protected groups.

Age and Gender

The following table sets out the age and gender for Southborough and High Brooms based on mid-year 2013 estimates from the office of national statistics. This information will be used to determine how balanced a response rate the consultation receives.

The initial questionnaire had a higher level of female respondents than male respondents and additional resource will be put into increasing male participation through for example, writing to the High Brooms Men's Club and seeking their feedback.

In addition respondents to the questionnaire were found to be from either the older or younger population. This was in line with what the Hall catered for suggesting that the impact would be greatly felt by these two criteria and therefore these have been identified as key impacted groups.
