Summary and recommendations of equality analysis/impact assessment.

Context

The County Council is the Strategic Commissioner of Education Provision in Kent and has a duty to ensure that sufficient school places are available to meet demand. The Commissioning Plan for Education Provision in Kent sets out Kent's commissioning intentions and is revised annually. The 2018-22 edition was endorsed by Education and Young People's Cabinet Committee in 27 November 2017 and agreed by Cabinet at their meeting in January 2018. The Plan forecasts an increase in the demand for Secondary school places across the Swale District, from September 2019, particularly in Sittingbourne. KCC is expecting that up to an additional eight forms entry will be required to provide sufficient Secondary school places in Sittingbourne during the period 2019 to 2023, if capacity is not added, there will not be enough places available to meet demand and parental preference.

Aims and Objectives

A deficit of 90 places is predicted for Year 7 across Swale district for entry in September 2019. The pressure in Sittingbourne can only be managed through adding temporary places at The Westlands School. Sittingbourne Community College and Fulston Manor School have already expanded and are unable to permanently expand further but Sittingbourne Community College could provide some temporary Year 7 places/bulge classes should more be required.

The shortfall of Year 7 places is expected to increase further from September 2021. KCC is planning to meet this deficit through the permanent expansion of The Westlands School, subject to future consultation and planning and adding temporary places in agreement with the other Secondary schools. It is hoped that the site for a new 6FE Secondary school, agreed with developers on the North Sittingbourne (Quinton Road) site, will become available by 2021.

Analysis and information - Ursuline College

- The Westlands School is an Academy and has a published admission number (PAN) of 285. However, over recent years the school has admitted above this number to provide places to meet demand. The school has a total capacity for Years 7 to 11 of 1,325 and the number on roll Years 7 to 11 in January 2018 was 1,471.
- Agreement has been given by Swale Academies Trust to provide 45 temporary Year 7 places from September 2019.
- The age range for the school is 11 to 18 years.
- 11.1% of the students are eligible for free school meals
- 3.6% of the students have an Education, Health and Care Plan (ECHP)
- 13.4% of the students have been assessed as having special educational needs:
- 2.7% of students are learning to speak English as an additional language.
