LIST OF FORTHCOMING EXECUTIVE DECISIONS

Each week the list of Forthcoming Executive Decisions is updated where there are additions, deletions or amendments to be made. Although Kent County Council aims to include all known decisions, statute requires that all Key decisions must be publicised in this way.

A "Key Decision" is an Executive-side Decision which is likely to:

- (a) result in the council incurring expenditure which is, or the making of savings which are, significant having regard to the council's budget for the service or function to which the decision relates; or
- (b) be significant in terms of its effects on communities living or working in an area comprising two or more electoral divisions in the area of the local authority.

Key Decisions can only be taken by the Cabinet, the Leader or an individual Cabinet Member.

Decisions which should be regarded as Key Decisions because they are likely to have a significant effect either in financial terms or on the Council's services to the community include:

- (a) Decisions about expenditure or savings over £1,000,000 which are not provided for within the approved budget or Medium Term Financial Plan
- (b) Adoption of major new policies not included in the Policy Framework (Constitution Appendix 3) or significant changes to established policies
- (c) Decisions that involve significant service developments, significant service reductions, or significant changes in the way that services are delivered, whether County-wide or in a particular locality. For example, closure of a school, approval of a major project (such as a highway scheme) or programme of works, major changes in the eligibility criteria for provision of a service, major changes in the fees charged for a service, or proposals that would result in a service currently provided in-house being outsourced.
- (e) Decisions where the consequences are likely to result in compulsory redundancies or major changes in the terms and conditions of employment of a significant number of employees in any of the Council's functions.

Preparation of the list helps the Council to programme its work and ensures compliance with the 'Local Authorities (Executive Arrangements) (Meetings and Access to Information) (England) regulations 2012.

The list outlines the consultation that is proposed in respect of future decisions and who members of the public and the Council should contact to make comments on any particular item. Anyone is entitled to obtain copies of the documents that will be relied upon when a decision is taken, unless those documents are 'Exempt' within the meaning of the relevant sections of the Local Government Act 1972 (as amended).

Reports related to decisions will be published on the Council's web site at www.kent.gov.uk at least five days before the decision it is due to be taken. Once the decision has been

Sandwich Highways Depot

Latest Update:

19/05/2014: Decision due date changed from 23/12/2013 to 'Not before' 01/11/2014. REASON: The disposals team at KCC are currently working on new plans for the site in order to ensure that the maximum value for the site is secured. Options appraisal work is underway and this work is expected to take approx. 6 months, therefore an expected decision date is set for November.

To seek approval to proceed with the disposal of the above site to raise a capital receipt which will be allocated to support the capital programme.

To seek approval to identify and progress with the acquisition of a new site for the service.

The Director of Property and Infrastructure Support will be authorised to finalise terms for both the disposal and acquisition of a new site.

This decision is needed to enable a modern highway service operation to be provided in the East Kent Area that is both reactive and responsive to changing demands. It directly supports 3 of the Bold Steps for Kent.

- Firstly it helps deliver the "Kent Environment Strategy" by the provision of new environmentally friendly facilities (e.g. grey water) via the construction technique with the eventual adaptation of new work practices within the new depot.
- Secondly it builds relations with key business sectors across Kent as the supply chain involved in such a project provides work to businesses of all sizes.
- Thirdly by the better siting and provision of facilities for the new depot it ensures
 that the most robust and effective public protection arrangements are in place
 for road management including bad weather response.

The impact of the decision is that full assessment of the potential disposal of the site can be explored within the market place to ensure that best value principles are adhered to. In tandem a full search and feasibility study will be undertaken to identify a new location for the alternative highways depot which satisfies the above objectives.

14/00136	Reason if Key Decision:

Charging for Adult Social Care, Deferred Payments and Temporary Financial Assistance

This issue will be dealt with by two decisions:

Decision 14/00135 - Charging for Adult Care and Support: That Kent County Council exercise its power under Section 14 of The Care Act 2014 to charge, from 1 April 2015, for the same adult social care and support services that it currently charges for, as at 31 March 2014.

Financial Implications: In relation to this decision specifically, there are not expected to be significant financial implications for 2015-16 as there will be no change to the groups of people and services that are charged/charged for. Further, the details of how to charge individuals (as laid down in The Care and Support (Charging and Assessment of Resources) Regulations 2014) do not depart significantly from the current system until April 2016. From April 2016 there will be financial implications from charging due to the raising of the capital threshold for people in residential care whose former home is taken into account in the financial assessment. In addition the wider Care Act changes will have significant financial implications.

Legal Implications: The decision is believed to be necessary in order for the Council to be able to continue to charge in the same way as it currently does

for residential and non-residential care and support. Currently local authorities have a duty to charge for residential care (under section 22 (1) of the National Assistance Act 1948) and a power to charge for non-residential services (under section 17 of the Health and Social Services and Social Security Adjudications Act 1983, which Kent does exercise for most non-residential services). These powers and duties will cease from April 2015 and are being replaced by a power to charge under section 14 of the Care Act 2014.

Equality Implications: It was considered whether an Equalities Impact Assessment should be carried out but it was decided this was not necessary as there will be no substantive changes to which people are charged for care and support and for which services.

Decision14/00136 - Deferred Payments and Temporary Financial Assistance: That Kent County Council introduces the new Deferred Payments scheme from 1 April 2015 (with both mandatory and discretionary elements). It is further recommended that the current Temporary Financial Assistance scheme should cease after 31 March 2015 as the new Deferred Payments scheme will cover the same groups of individuals.

Financial Implications: It is expected that there will be more people taking up the new Universal Deferred Payment scheme than the current Deferred Payment and TFA schemes combined. Currently there are about 50-100 new DP or TFA cases each year. It is estimated that from the introduction of the new scheme there will be 300-400 new applications each year. The costs to administer these will be largely covered by the admin charges which are permitted and the interest which will be added to the cost of the loan (the maximum interest being laid down by Government). There are implications in terms of cash flow but the money will generally be repaid as it secured on the individual's property. Secured debt will however increase as a result of the changes. This will be largely unavoidable as most of the new scheme is mandatory.

Legal Implications: The rules governing the new Deferred Payments Scheme from April 2015 will allow wider discretion in the ability of councils to pay for an individual's residential care who would otherwise be expected to pay the full cost but whose capital is not accessible (usually because it is tied up in a property). This will cover those situations currently covered by the discretionary Temporary Financial Assistance scheme (for example, when the property is jointly-owned or there is already a mortgage on it). It is not, therefore, believed to be necessary to maintain the Temporary Financial Assistance scheme.

Equality Implications: It was considered whether an Equalities Impact Assessment should be carried out but it was decided this was not necessary as the new Deferred Payments scheme will encompass the types of people currently covered by the current Deferred Payments scheme and Temporary Financial Assistance.

The Cabinet Committee resolved that the decision proposed to be taken by the Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care and Public Health (that the County Council should exercise its power under Section 14 of the Care Act 2014 to charge, from 1 April 2015, for the same services that it currently charges for, as at 31 March 2014) be endorsed.

Other consultation planned or undertaken:

Public consultation is not planned as there will be no significant change to who the council charges and for what services.

14/00136 – The proposed policy was considered by KCC Cabinet on 1 December 2014 and by the Adult Social Care and Health Cabinet Committee on 4 December 2014.

The Cabinet Committee resolved that the decision proposed to be taken by the Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care and Public Health (that the County Council should adopt from 1 April 2015, both the mandatory and discretionary elements of the proposed Deferred Payments scheme (as set out in Sections 34 and 35 of the Care Act 2014), and the current Temporary Financial Assistance scheme end for new clients on 31 March 2015) be endorsed.

Other consultation planned or undertaken:

Public consultation is not planned as the scheme is largely governed by national legislation and the discretionary elements of the new Deferred Payment scheme will cover those individuals currently covered by the TFA scheme.

Contract Extension for Kent Community Health NHS Trust (KCHT) - Health Trainers Service

Decision: To extend the current contract with Kent Community Health NHS Trust (KCHT)) until 31st January 2016, pending competitive tender of the Health Trainers Service in summer 2015.

How the decision relates to BS4K and Corporate Objectives: In line with Facing the Challenge principles, extending the existing contract will allow for a focus on outcomes, whilst allowing a consultation exercise to be carried out with all stakeholders.

Adult Social Care and CCGs have not yet finished their scoping and service design. Therefore, extending the current contract will give the benefit of easier alignment when the models of social care and well-being via a range of identified community 'agents' are in place. It will also enable Public Health to co-design the service together with other health and social care commissioners and get better value for the existing contracts.

Financial Implications: Up to maximum of £1,200,000 (if the provider meets all of its targets for recruitment).

Legal Implications: The decision will require a single source tender to extend the existing contract to 31st January 2016.

Furthermore, this was informed by the publication of the national sexual health improvement plan.

Subsequently, four consultation events were organised across Kent with guest speaker, the national lead for teenage pregnancy. These events were attended by over 120 professionals working in areas such as sexual health, children's centres, early intervention, school nurses, midwives and teachers and social care, who agreed the key strategy themes and actions.

The strategy themes have been tested through Head Start Kent programme aiming to build emotional resilience in adolescents. Co-production with

children and young parents, teachers and children and young people's workers has been an essential part of this programme. In addition, the views of children and young people have been sought through a consultation event (July 2013) and peer led activities in schools with over 400 participating young people (2013-14 academic year).

Finally, we consulted with stakeholders and partners such as sexual health, education, children centres, KIASS, KIFSS, CCGs and local health and wellbeing boards, youth champions and Kent youth forum. The responses to the consultation have been noted and incorporated as appropriately to the strategy.

Approval is sought for a decision to be taken by the Cabinet Member for Corporate & Democratic Services to enter into relevant contracts for the construction of the Trinity Free School and the Sevenoaks Grammar Annexe at the Wilderness site.

The project is in line with Kent Corporate Objectives and in particular supports the following Bold Steps for Kent priorities to:

Help the Kent Economy grow: the construction cost value to the Kent economy will be a minimum of c£13.35m based on the SCAPE KPI of 70% of the capital value being spent in the local area.

Putting the Citizen in Control: there is currently no selective education provision within the Sevenoaks district, this puts the parents in the Sevenoaks area at a disadvantage as they need to travel out of district to selective provision in Tonbridge or Tunbridge Wells areas. The Education Commissioning plan uses a district-wide model to provide consistency with the twelve district councils. The forecasts for selective schools most preferred for the Sevenoaks South population, 12 schools in number, all indicate a steady increase in demand for Year 7 places over the next 10 years. Therefore it has been calculated that demand for a selective school in the Sevenoaks area is required to meet the statutory basic need of education places.

To tackle disadvantage: Currently 1150 students travel outside of the Sevenoaks district to access Selective education each day. Whilst there is capacity for these students in neighbouring districts it does not avoid the need for all of these students to attend school in their local district area. (There could be a limited case to increase the size/capacity of the schools in neighbouring districts, but the estimated capacity of these schools will be absorbed by the increases in student numbers expected directly within these districts by 2018).

Broadband Delivery UK (BDUK) project - Phase 2

To seek agreement to:

- 1. Enter into a contract to deliver the Kent and Medway BDUK extension project
- 2. Enter into a grant agreement with BDUK to draw down the £5.6 million Government funding.

In accordance with the Council's Scheme of Delegation to Officers, senior officers may take any actions necessary to implement the decision as set out above. On this occasion the Corporate Director, Strategic and Corporate Services, in consultation with the Cabinet Member for Economic Development and the Cabinet Member for Education and Health Reform will negotiate final terms and conditions (unless further delegated).

This project will build upon the work of the existing Kent and Medway BDUK project – by further extending the reach of superfast broadband service. The current Kent and Medway BDUK project is working to bring superfast broadband of at least 24mbps to at least 91% of premises and ensure that every property in the project area will be able to access a standard broadband service of at least 2mbps by the end of 2015.

The government has recently awarded additional funding of £5.6 million as part of a new programme, which Kent County Council is matching, to extend the reach of superfast broadband services even further across Kent. We are currently working with BDUK, the government's agency for delivering broadband, to take this 'phase 2' project forward – which is aiming to ensure that at least 95% of properties across the UK can access superfast broadband services by 2017.

Financial Implications: The project will receive £5.6 million of Government funding which will be matched by KCC.

Legal Implications: This decision will involve KCC entering into a grant agreement with Broadband Delivery UK (part of the Department of Culture, Media and Sport) and a contract with an infrastructure provider.

Equality Implications: This project is about extending the reach of superfast broadband services and reducing geographical inequalities in the access to superfast broadband infrastructure.

Further information: Transforming Kent and Medway's broadband infrastructure will be critical for delivering Kent's strategic ambitions as this project seeks to:

- Deliver economic growth by removing a significant barrier to development
- Support KCC's ambition to put the citizen in control by providing the infrastructure to support the transformation of public services especially channel-shift agendas and next generation assisted living technologies.

• Tackle disadvantage by increasing access to services and improving educational outcomes.

Furthermore through helping to reduce the need to travel by enabling greater home-working, this project will also contribute towards the delivery of a number of environmental outcomes around carbon reduction.

Update 4 February 2015:

The Canterbury Local Transport Strategy was considered and the principle endorsed by the Environment and Transport Cabinet Committee in December 2014. A formal decision will now be taken by the Cabinet Member which will set out the terms of the support for the strategy.

To agree various local transport strategies.

The strategies will 'Help the 'Kent Economy Grow' and 'Tackle Disadvantage' by managing congestion in town centres, improving the reliability of journey times for commuters and visitors and managing freight journeys more successfully. This will in turn enhance key sustainable transport links to employment, education and health care.

Impacts / Costs and risks of proposed decisions:

The transport strategies to be agreed all form part a key part of evidence base for the relevant Local Plan. These plans will be subject to and examination in public by and independent planning inspector during 2015. The appropriateness and deliverability of each strategy will be an important consideration in the inspector's decision on the soundness of the Plan as a whole.

The delivery of each transport strategy will be heavily dependent on securing funding contributions from development through the section 106 and Community Infrastructure

Levy (CIL) processes, as KCC's Local Transport Plan funding allocation from Central Government is likely to be under sustained pressure from the foreseeable future. KCC will not be the charging authority therefore it will be reliant on each local council as the planning authority to allocate sufficient CIL revenue to the priority transport infrastructure projects identified in the strategy. The availability of CIL revenue will in turn be dictated by the phasing and extent of new development which will be influenced by a range of external factors.
