LIST OF FORTHCOMING EXECUTIVE DECISIONS

Each week the list of Forthcoming Executive Decisions is updated where there are additions, deletions or amendments to be made. Although Kent County Council aims to include all known decisions, statute requires that all Key decisions must be publicised in this way.

A "Key Decision" is an Executive-side Decision which is likely to:

- (a) result in the council incurring expenditure which is, or the making of savings which are, significant having regard to the council's budget for the service or function to which the decision relates; or
- (b) be significant in terms of its effects on communities living or working in an area comprising two or more electoral divisions in the area of the local authority.

Key Decisions can only be taken by the Cabinet, the Leader or an individual Cabinet Member.

Decisions which should be regarded as Key Decisions because they are likely to have a significant effect either in financial terms or on the Council's services to the community include:

- (a) Decisions about expenditure or savings over £1,000,000 which are not provided for within the approved budget or Medium Term Financial Plan
- (b) Adoption of major new policies not included in the Policy Framework (Constitution Appendix 3) or significant changes to established policies
- (c) Decisions that involve significant service developments, significant service reductions, or significant changes in the way that services are delivered, whether County-wide or in a particular locality. For example, closure of a school, approval of a major project (such as a highway scheme) or programme of works, major changes in the eligibility criteria for provision of a service, major changes in the fees charged for a service, or proposals that would result in a service currently provided in-house being outsourced.
- (e) Decisions where the consequences are likely to result in compulsory redundancies or major changes in the terms and conditions of employment of a significant number of employees in any of the Council's functions.

Preparation of the list helps the Council to programme its work and ensures compliance with the 'Local Authorities (Executive Arrangements) (Meetings and Access to Information) (England) regulations 2012.

The list outlines the consultation that is proposed in respect of future decisions and who members of the public and the Council should contact to make comments on any particular item. Anyone is entitled to obtain copies of the documents that will be relied upon when a decision is taken, unless those documents are 'Exempt' within the meaning of the relevant sections of the Local Government Act 1972 (as amended).

Reports related to decisions will be published on the Council's web site at www.kent.gov.uk at least five days before the decision it is due to be taken. Once the decision has been

Update July 2015 – Decision withdrawn:

Developments to the proposals for Sandgate Library mean that plans are now for the refurbishment of the Library only and are within existing delegations to senior officers. Therefore no formal Cabinet Member decision will be required.

To seek approval to delegate responsibility to Sandgate Parish Council for the day to day running of Library services from Sandgate Library, working with volunteers. KCC will retain the statutory responsibility for providing Library services.

Delegation of care and support	functions under the Care Act

2014

The local authority wishes to exercise this power in order to effectively implement the requirements of the Act in a timely and cost effective manner. Initially it is believed this would be in the following areas:

- Assessment and care provision for prisoners (new duty from April 2015 under s76 of the Act).
- Carers' assessments and support for carers
- Specialist assessments and support for deaf people

Specialist assessments and support for blind people

The detailed decisions of how this will work in practice can be taken by the Corporate Director for Social Care, Health and Wellbeing, after full discussion in each case with the Cabinet Member for Adult Social Care and Public Health and the Adult Transformation Board.

Section 79 of the Care Act gives local authorities the power to delegate most of the care and support functions it has under Part 1 of the Act or under section 117 of the Mental Health Act 1983 (after-care services). The only exceptions relate to promoting integration with health services, cooperating with partners, safeguarding and decisions about which services to charge for.

Delegation of functions does not absolve the local authority of responsibility for these functions and it still remains legally accountable for the way in which the functions are carried out or failed to be carried out. The local authority can, therefore, impose strict conditions on how a third party organisation undertakes the function that has been delegated to it. If the local authority chooses to exercise its power under Section 79, it is able to determine the extent to which it delegates the function in any particular case, i.e. it can delegate all or part of a function. For example the carrying out of an assessment could be delegated with the final decision kept in-house or also delegated.

There are likely to be financial implications attached to the specific decisions delegated to the Corporate Director as a result of the in-principle decision to allow delegation of certain adult care and support functions. However as delegation is unlikely to be recommended unless it is seen as cost effective, the implications are expected to be positive for the Council, or at least cost-neutral.

Legal Implications:

Section 79 of the Care Act gives local authorities the power to delegate most of the care and support functions it has under Part 1 of the Act or under section 117 of the Mental Health Act 1983 (after-care services). The only exceptions relate to promoting integration with health services, cooperating with partners, safeguarding and decisions about which services to charge for.

Delegation of functions does not absolve the local authority of responsibility for these functions and it still remains legally accountable for the way in which the functions are carried out or if they fail to be carried out.

Any specific decisions taken by the Corporate Director will be taken in full cognisance of the legal considerations concerning procurement and commissioning.

Kent Teenage Pregnancy Strategy 2015 - 2020

To approve the Kent Teenage Pregnancy Strategy for 2015-2020

The strategy has been informed by stakeholder engagement events, which included the views of sexual health workers, school nurses, midwives, district level representatives, health improvement workers, early intervention workers and teachers and has been developed by close collaboration between public

health and education and young people teams. In developing the strategy, the findings and recommendations of the Kent County Council Select Committee: PSHE/Children's Health report (2007) were taken into consideration. The report's recommendations will also be used as the basis of developing local action plans

The strategy was subject to an equality impact assessment and stakeholder and public consultation. Feedback from the consultation has been incorporated.

The aim of the strategy is to help young people to thrive, become resilient and make positive contributions to their communities and wider society. This will be achieved by providing access to information, services and early help, so that they can make appropriate choices about their sexual relationships. When young people decide to have a child, they should have support to achieve the best possible outcome for themselves and their children. Young people should be involved in this work.

As well as improving the information, advice and support we provide to all young people and introducing measures so that sexually active young people can access contraception easily and use it effectively, our success in reducing teenage pregnancy rates will also depend on how effectively we tackle the underlying factors that increase the risk of teenage pregnancy – such as poverty, low educational attainment, poor attendance at school, non-participation in post-16 learning and low aspirations. Offering appropriate support to young people who are experiencing these underlying risk factors will help to build their resilience and raise their aspirations and so reduce the likelihood that they experience a range of poor outcomes, including teenage pregnancy.

Care Leavers Support Policy

To agree Kent County Council's policy on care leavers and their transition to adulthood.

The decision relates to Corporate Objectives and will support the Council's objective to improve services for the most vulnerable people in Kent.

The aim of providing Care Leavers support is to ensure that young people leaving care and preparing to leave care receive support and help to assist them in making a successful transition to adulthood. Ofsted's single inspection framework, introduced in November 2013, also now includes a specific grade judgement on local authorities' services to care leavers, and requires that the plans for young people leaving care are effective and address their individual needs. Local authorities are required to ensure that young people feel safe, particularly where they live and that they acquire the necessary skills and emotional resilience to successfully move towards independence.

The Council has no legal alternative but to provide equitable Care Leavers Services to all eligible young people irrespective of their route into care. Previously unaccompanied asylum seeking children with Leave to Remain (LTR) in the UK must be afforded the same level of services as indigenous young people in accordance with their need.

The consistent policy will:

- Create a single policy for all care leavers.
- Provide consistency of application of the policy between indigenous and previously unaccompanied asylum seeking care leavers.
- Provide clear guidance for staff, care leavers, foster carers, partner agencies and third sector organisations.
- Be clear about the amount of funds available and any legal process that may apply.

The policy sets out which services will be provided to all care leavers, and which will be based on an assessment of need. All financial support is non-repayable, and has been set in line with national minimal guidelines.

Financial Implications.

The total cost of supporting <u>Care Leavers</u> to the Council in 2014/15 is forecasted as follows:

UASC Care Leavers Indigenous Care Leavers

£4.97 m

£4.72 m

Total £ 9.7 m

These costs are made up of indirect costs of £2.6m for staffing and infrastructure costs, and £7.09m of direct costs for individuals concerned.

The new policy aims to reduce the overall direct costs for eligible care leavers by 5% in 2015/16. In addition to these, work is being undertaken to reduce the £834K costs currently attributable to non-eligible UASC care leavers through the undertaking of Human Rights Assessments.

The Council receives as income £1.89 m from the Home Office towards the cost of supporting Care UASC care leavers.

The adoption of the policy will ensure that all financial provision is awarded on the basis of assessed need in line with Children Act statutory guidance and not on the basis of immigration status alone.

The policy will enable the expenditure currently accrued for the over 21 cohort in UASC to be rationalised and reduced in line with Statutory Guidance.

Advocacy seeks to ensure that people, particularly those who are most vulnerable in society, are able to:

- Have their voice heard on issues that are important to them
- Defend and safeguard their rights
- Have their views and wishes genuinely considered when decisions are being made about their lives

Kent County Council Adult Services has a history of commissioning both statutory and non-statutory advocacy services. These services have been commissioned using both contracts and grants on an ad-hoc basis to meet specific local need, or to meet requirements of legislation for statutory advocacy. This range of services is currently being delivered via 17 different providers. Services are not aligned or standardised and some client groups are under-represented and have fallen through the gaps between services.

Statutory advocacy provision is governed by legislation and is therefore reasonably well structured and managed. The non-statutory provision, mainly grant funded, is a collection of different interpretations of advocacy and is therefore less clear cut in terms of what is delivered, by whom, and to what standard.

New requirements under the Care Act 2015 and the ending of current NHS Complaints Advocacy Contract and Independent Mental Capacity Advocacy (IMCA) contract in April 2016 have provided us with the opportunity to revisit the current model and commission something different that works for people regardless of client categories and to ensure consistency of supply and quality. We have worked closely with users of advocacy services, Advocacy providers and practitioners to design a new way to deliver advocacy services.

Financial Implications

By bringing together the current spend on Advocacy across grants and contracts, together with £482k of new money from the Care Act Grant, officers have identified a budget of up to £1.49m which could be used to recommission Advocacy services. This spend is set out in Appendix 1.

There will be impact on a number of voluntary sector organisations where their activity will be decommissioned and their funding for advocacy delivery will be reallocated to the advocacy contract. These organisations are aware of this and have been involved in a range of co-production events and discussions with commissioners.

- Secondly it builds relations with key business sectors across Kent as the supply chain involved in such a project provides work to businesses of all sizes.
- Thirdly by the better siting and provision of facilities for the new depot it ensures that the most robust and effective public protection arrangements are in place for road management including bad weather response.

The impact of the decision is that full assessment of the potential disposal of the site can be explored within the market place to ensure that best value principles are adhered to. In tandem a full search and feasibility study will be undertaken to identify a new location for the alternative highways depot which satisfies the above objectives.

The proposal directly links to Bold Steps for Kent, putting the citizen in control, building new partnerships and providing a new fit for purpose building to deliver Library and FSC services in conjunction with other partners such as the Citizen's Advice Bureau and House (West Kent Action), to support Kent's more vulnerable citizens.

The impact of the decision will be that KCC will have less control of the management and operation of the centre as they would become the responsibility of a third party.

Risks identified are:

- Reliance on the professionalism of the trustees to deliver a successful facility, agreeing with all partners a financial model for the charitable vehicle
- Reputational damage to KCC if the charitable vehicle were to fail
- Obtaining buy in from all community groups in occupation to form trust
- Untried and untested model
- Level of income generation from the centre which could go to the charitable vehicle is currently unknown as a new facility
- Continued KCC ownership of a non-core asset
- Officers may be unable to get agreement from stakeholders, charitable vehicle does not prove financially sustainable or the trust may break down and charitable vehicle will have to pick up void periods and associated costs (benefit to KCC).
