LIST OF FORTHCOMING EXECUTIVE DECISIONS

Every two weeks the list of Forthcoming Executive Decisions is updated where there are additions, deletions or amendments to be made. It is a statutory requirement that all Key decisions must be publicised in this way, although Kent County Council aims to extend this requirement so that any proposed Executive decision is included.

A "Key Decision" is an Executive-side Decision which is likely to:

- a) result in the council incurring expenditure which is, or the making of savings which are, significant having regard to the council's budget for the service or function to which the decision relates; (Kent County Council have set this limit at £1million and over), or
- b) be significant in terms of its effects on communities living or working in an area comprising two or more electoral divisions in the area of the local authority.

Key Decisions at Kent County Council can only be taken by the Cabinet, the Leader or an individual Cabinet Member.

Decisions which should be regarded as Key Decisions because they are likely to have a significant effect either in financial terms or on the Council's services to the community include:

- (a) Adoption of new policies or strategies or significant changes or variations to established policies
- (b) Decisions that involve significant service developments, significant service reductions, or significant changes in the way that services are delivered, whether County-wide or in a particular locality.
- (c) Decisions where the consequences are likely to result in compulsory redundancies or major changes in the terms and conditions of employment of a significant number of employees in any of the Council's functions.

Preparation of the list helps the Council to programme its work and ensures compliance with the 'Local Authorities (Executive Arrangements) (Meetings and Access to Information) (England) regulations 2012.

The list also outlines the consultation that is proposed in respect of future decisions and signposts members of the public and elected members to an appropriate officer of the council should they wish to make comments or ask questions about a particular item.

Anyone is entitled to obtain copies of the documents that will be relied upon when a decision is taken, unless those documents are 'Exempt' within the meaning of the relevant sections of the Local Government Act 1972 (as amended).

Reports related to decisions will be published on the Council's web site at www.kent.gov.uk at least five days before the decision it is due to be taken. Once the decision has been taken, a copy of the Record of Decision will also be published on the Council's website. 16/00120 Sub National Transport Board for the South-East

To seek agreement to establish, and participate in, a shadow Sub National Transport Body (SNTB) for the South East, known as Transport for the South East (TfSE), at the cost, for the purposes, and with the membership, set out in the report and to seek agreement, in principle, to establish, and participate in, a formal Sub-National Transport Body for the South East also known as TfSE and with the same purpose and membership.

The Cities and Local Government Devolution Act makes provision for the establishment and constitution of Sub-National Transport Bodies (SNTBs) for any area in England (outside of Greater London). An SNTB can prepare a Transport Strategy for an area which would set out proposals for the promotion and encouragement of safe, sustainable, integrated, efficient and economic strategic transport facilities and services to and from the area of the SNTB.

The South East Seven (SE7) Councils (Kent, East Sussex, West Sussex, Hampshire and Surrey County Councils, and Brighton & Hove City Council and Medway Council) and the Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) that represent the area have discussed the establishment of an SNTB for the South East, to be called Transport for the South East (TfSE). A TfSE on this geographic scale would fulfil the DfT's minimum geographic size requirements. Discussions will shortly commence with Portsmouth, Southampton and the Isle of Wight and the Solent LEP about joining TfSE.

The proposed TfSE would enable authorities to influence national and regional infrastructure providers, helping to secure the infrastructure required to support continuing economic growth. A TfSE would see Government, South East Transport Authorities and/or Combined Authorities and LEPs working together with Highways England, Network Rail and port, airport and bus operators. TfSE would require strategic transport providers to take account of its priorities.

TfSE would provide a mechanism for the area to speak with a strong, common voice on transport infrastructure and provide a single platform for strategic transport and infrastructure issues, giving partners greater, and potentially direct, influence over decisions that are currently made elsewhere. Its key outcome will be the development of a single, strategic transport infrastructure framework which would align the investment programmes from key agencies, such as Highways England,

Network Rail and the LEPs.

Options

- 1. Do nothing and not engage in the development of the SNTB for the Southeast
- 2. Set up the SNTB for Kent and Medway, but this would not be supported by DfT
- 3. Engage in the development of the Shadow SNTB Board and Transport Strategy for the Southeast

The cornerstone of TfSE is the Transport Strategy. It will build upon existing Local Transport Plans, including Kent's Local Transport Plan 4: Delivering Growth without Gridlock, currently out to consultation, and evidence already in place amongst the constituent Authorities, including the LEP's Strategic Economic Plans and growth and infrastructure frameworks/studies being undertaken by a number of upper-tier Authorities, including the Kent and Medway Growth and Infrastructure Framework. In this way, the decision would support the Council's second strategic outcome, "Communities benefit from economic growth by being in work, healthy and enjoying a good quality of life."

17/00009 - Visitor Economy Services

Under Key Decision 13/00080, a visitor economy services contract was awarded to Visit Kent at £280,000 per annum, for three years with an option to extend for a further three years to March 2020. Under the terms of the current contract, the County Council also agreed to provide additional staff and financial resources to support visit Kent's activities. The contract requires Visit Kent to develop and deliver innovation and creative solutions to grow the Kent visitor economy, and to support KCC's priorities for the sector which are to:

- Promote the county to target visitor markets, and to increase the numbers of visitors to Kent and the value of visitor spend;
- Support growth in the Kent visitor economy;
- Provide high quality support to the Kent tourism business sector;
- Improve the skills levels of employees within Kent's visitor economy; and
- Attract additional public and private sector investment.

Policy context

The proposed decision is consistent with the following outcomes in KCC's Strategic Statement ('increasing Opportunities, Improving Outcomes):

- Kent communities feel the benefits of economic growth by being in work, healthy and enjoying a good quality of life (Strategic Outcome);
- Kent business growth is supported by having access to a well skilled workforce (Supported Outcome);
- All Kent's communities benefit from economic growth and lower levels of deprivation (Supporting Outcome); and
- Kent residents enjoy a good quality of life and more people benefit from greater social, cultural and sporting opportunities.

16/00038a2 School Public Health Services

The Children's Social Care and Health Cabinet Committee previously endorsed plans to commission new School Public Health Services across Kent through a competitive procurement process. This procurement process started earlier in 2016 and is being undertaken as part of the wider procurement of the Children's Emotional Wellbeing and Mental Health Services across the county.

The combined annual budget for the first year of the contracts will be approximately £5.6m and will be funded from the Public Health grant. The contract values will be subject to a year-on-year reduction over the life of the contract, in line with the planned reductions to the Public Health grant.

The total combined contract values over the initial five year term will be £26m. The new services are due to start operating on 1st April 2017.

Legal Implications: The contracts will only be awarded following conclusion of the competitive tendering process.

Proposed decision: Contract variation to the Kent Learning Disability Advocacy Contract to incorporate Community Advocacy for People with a Learning Disability.

How the decision relates to Corporate Objectives:

Supports the outcome outlined in 'Increasing opportunities, Improving outcomes', which states that the Council wants older and vulnerable residents to be safe and supported, with choices, to live independently.

Financial Implications: The overall value of the Kent Learning Disability Advocacy contract is £1.1m. The annual cost of the Community Advocacy for People with a Learning Disability contract is currently £268k per annum.

A library management system is a fundamental component of the modern library service which covers all the core functions necessary to run the service- issue and discharge items, the library catalogue and all the information on our members. This business case outlines the preferred option as LRA approaches the end of the current contract.

The current contract for the Libraries Management System software (Spydus) was procured as part of an innovative SELMS (South Eastern Library Management System) consortium (a consortium of 11 library authorities working in collaboration) using the Local Authority Software Applications (LASA) Framework which is due to expire on 31st March 2017. Kent are keen to stay part of the consortium as enables greater collective buying power.

As a result a new accessible contract which has been procured through SELMS and which is open to all SELMS members and is now recommended for Kent to sign up to. This contract is due to commence on 1st April 2017. The contract will run for five years with an option to extend for a further two years until 31st March 2024. The total contract

cost for the 5 years will be £898,054 and will result in a saving to KCC of £333,788 over this period, with potential further savings of £120k in years 6-7.

Background

KCC is the lead partner in delivering the Kent Environment Strategy and has had a publicly available Environment Policy since approximately 2005. Since April 2009, all KCC services have been certified to the International Standard for Environmental Management ISO14001, which requires the organisation to approve and publish its commitment to prevent pollution and continually improve its environmental performance in the form of an Environment Policy. A decision is required to confirm that the commitment statements in the revised draft are appropriate and that resources will be directed to achieve it.

Options

- a) Retain existing policy, which was last revised and published in 2012
- b) Approve a revised policy, which reflects the current Kent Environment Strategy and organisational priorities.

How the proposed decision meets the objectives of 'Increasing Opportunities, Improving Outcomes: Kent County Council's Strategic Statement (2015-2020)'

The policy is directly linked to the Kent Environment Strategy and key strategy for KCC and its Kent partners. The policy commitments reflect the need to achieve resource efficiencies from utilities, waste and transport, which will deliver organisational cost savings. In addition, commitment to increasing resilience will ensure Kent communities benefit from reduced service disruption and be supported more effectively during severe weather events.

Financial implications

This directly supports Council budget savings. There are no additional financial implications beyond existing efficiency programmes and resources. Existing programmes being: LED street lighting strategy, Infrastructure targets to reduce the costs of energy, water and waste and use existing Mobilisation of Assets budget or utilise the 0% Salix invest-to-save-loan funds. All services are expected to achieve costs savings from business travel/transport and existing transformation activity/fleet refresh is largely delivering this.

Legal implications

16/00148 A2 Bean and Ebbsfleet Junction Improvement - funding contribution by the Strategic Transport Infrastructure Programme (STP)		

The Kent Thameside Strategic Transport Infrastructure Programme (STiP) is a package of improvements that respond to assessments of the individual impacts and mitigation measures for significant development across the boroughs of Dartford and Gravesham. A Key Decision was taken on 21 February 2008 (decision no 07/01108) agreeing to the County Council acting as the Accountable Body for the programme.

The programme aims to provide key transport infrastructure improvements that would enable the planned level of development in Kent Thameside to be realised. Ultimately, the development will result in some 22,600 new homes and around 1 million m2 of commercial development with the potential for 60,000 jobs. The programme would be largely funded through a combination of public sector grants and private sector contributions.

Since the original decision was taken there have been considerable changes to the progress of developments and the available funding. This has resulted in a reduction in the then assumed funding levels reported in 2012 which were circa £84m down to £70m and an increase in projected scheme costs from £116m in 2012 to £169m today.

This is largely from increased to the Bean and Ebbsfleet scheme of £45m and £7.5m for Dartford Town Centre. It is worth noting that the whole cost of the Bean and Ebbsfleet Scheme was included in the costing summary in 2012 and this equated to £80m. Considering that the STIP fund is only required to make a reasonable contribution (from \$106 monies) and whilst the overall scheme costs may have increased to £125m the STIP fund is not required to cover the full amount.

Financial implications - scheme

As the Accountable Body for the programme, the County Council is responsible for the management of the programme and administration of funding received. A dedicated Programme Investment Fund has been set up within the County Councils corporate financial system and consists of the following funds and potential sources of funding:

- 13m Homes and Communities Agency Grant received and held in the account.
- 12.7m Local Growth Fund scheme specific allocations/approvals high confidence that this will all be approved.

• 5.1m New Homes Bonus (application is unlikely to be successful)/.

There are further amounts available to the fund by way of S106 monies and in the case of Dartford, potential CIL moneys which are subject to Member approval.

These amounts equate to

- £1,862,286m secured and received in the fund.
- £1,521,452m secured and held by the District Councils
- £31,025,550m secured but not received (Incl EQ).
- £2m subject to negotiation.

There are also additional S106,CIL monies identified that are either not secured, subject to lapsed permissions or development is not progressed which amounts to a further £10,275,820.

The total sum that would be available to the overall fund, assuming all elements could be confidently accounted for is £77,485,108.

However, applying a RAG status to all potential funds and removing the high risk/low confidence values, results in a potential STIP fund of £62,109,288. A summary of the above funding is attached in Appendix B.

Options

There is a requirement for the STIP fund to make a reasonable contribution to the A2 Bean scheme. The business case for the scheme is dependant on an acceptable level of private funding and a figure of £25m has been offered as a full and final contribution. In deciding this course of action, two options were considerate based on the above funding analysis:

1) A minimal contribution whereby an apportionment exercise is undertaking a percentage of each S106 (bearing in mind the pooling restrictions) in relation to the overall scheme cost and directing these monies to the project.

2) Direct to the Eastern Quarry S106 funds on £24.7m to the Project in their entirety as it is geographically adjacent to both the Bean and Ebbsfleet junctions plus an additional £300k from S106 monies.

A meeting of the lead STIP Members discussed these options and it was agreed that the most reasonably solution was to support option 2. This offer represents a pragmatic solution to the funding request, is easier to administer and fits within the leve3l of funding that has been identified as potentially available with the highest level of confidence.

A third option would be to not contribute any monies to the scheme and force the issue back to DfT but this course of action would:

- a) Make the scheme unaffordable
- b) Have an adverse affect on the development plans for the area.
- c) Not be in line with previous agreements and commitments to funding contributions.

Financial implications

There are no financial implications to KCC. There is no provision for underwriting the monies nor is there the availability to forward fund. This has been conveyed to both HE and DfT and KCC has explained that the amounts can only be collected as and when the various triggers are met for the development. Therefore, the risk associated to the funding profile rests with HE and DfT. A profile for the Eatern Quarry S106 funds is contained in the attached letter from the Cabinet Member for Economic Development to DfT (Appendix A) and a summary table of the STIP funds as currently stands in Appendix B.

The current contract expires 31 December 2017. Extension options have been considered by the Strategic Commissioning Board. However, these options are not viable in this instance as the incumbent supplier is unable to continue. Accordingly, in order to ensure a seamless service remains in place a new procurement is required which has the flexibility to accommodate devolution and enable local councils to opt in or out of the contract moving forward. Ongoing procurement with appropriate economies of scale enable market testing and ensures that the rates KCC pay for the work are competitive and reflective of the current market.

Options

The commissioning of all work streams within the soft landscape service was considered and agreed by the Strategic Commissioning Board on 4 July 2016. A broad range of commissioning solutions were debated and the extension of the current contract was preferred. However, the incumbent supplier is unable to continue. Therefore, the reprocurement of the urban grass shrubs and hedges service (Maidstone, Dartford, Canterbury and Thanet) will now be bought forward to ensure a seamless flexible service remains in place.

The urban grass shrubs and hedges service is a discretionary service that keeps Kent's Roads moving and assists economic growth.

Financial implications

The annual spend is estimated at £325k per annum and will continue to be funded from the soft landscape budget. The proposed contract length will be five years with an option to extend the contract for up to a further two years, on a one plus one basis. Should KCC decide to run the contract for the full term (seven years), including extensions the total expenditure is estimated at £2,275,000.

The Plan was considered and endorsed by the Education and Young People's Services Cabinet Committee on 15 December 2015 prior to the final version being considered and approved by Cabinet on 21 March 2016.

The availability of CIL revenue will in turn be dictated by the phasing and extent of new development which will be influenced by a range of external factors.

KCC Membership of a shadow Sub- National Transport Body for the South East known as Transport for the South East (TfSE)

The Cities and Local Government Devolution Act makes provision for the establishment and constitution of Sub-National Transport Bodies (SNTBs) for any area in England (outside of Greater London. An SNTB can prepare a Transport Strategy for an area which would set out proposals for the promotion and encouragement of safe,

sustainable, integrated, efficient and economic strategic transport facilities and services to and from the area of the SNTB.

The South East Seven (SE7) Councils (Kent, East Sussex, West Sussex, Hampshire and Surrey County Councils, and Brighton & Hove City Council and Medway Council) and the Local Enterprise Partnerships (LEPs) that represent the area have discussed the establishment of an SNTB for the South East, to be called Transport for the South East (TfSE). A TfSE on this geographic scale would fulfil the DfT's minimum geographic size requirements. Discussions will shortly commence with Portsmouth, Southampton and the Isle of Wight and the Solent LEP about joining TfSE.

The proposed TfSE would enables authorities to influence national and regional infrastructure providers, helping to secure the infrastructure required to support continuing economic growth. A TfSE would see Government, South East Transport Authorities and/or Combined Authorities and LEPs working together with Highways England, Network Rail and port, airport and bus operators. TfSE would require strategic transport providers to take account of its priorities.

TfSE would provide a mechanism for the area to speak with a strong, common voice on transport infrastructure and provide a single platform for strategic transport and infrastructure issues, giving partners greater, and potentially direct, influence over decisions that are currently made elsewhere. Its key outcome will be the development of a single, strategic transport infrastructure framework which would align the investment programmes from key agencies, such as Highways England, Network Rail and the LEPs.

Options

- Do nothing and not engage in the development of the SNTB for the Southeast.
- Set up the SNTB for Kent and Medway, but this would not be supported by DfT
- Engage in the development of the Shadow SNTB Board and Transport Strategy for the Southeast

How the proposed decision meets the objectives of 'Increasing Opportunities, Improving Outcomes: Kent County Council's Strategic Statement (2015-2020)'

The cornerstone of TfSE is the Transport Strategy. It will build upon existing Local Transport Plans, including Kent's Local Transport Plan 4: Delivering Growth without Gridlock, currently out to consultation, and evidence already in place amongst the constituent Authorities, including the LEP's Strategic Economic Plans and growth and infrastructure frameworks/studies being undertaken by a number of upper-tier Authorities, including the Kent and Medway Growth and Infrastructure Framework. In this way, the decision would support the Council's second strategic outcome, "Communities benefit from economic growth by being in work, healthy and enjoying a good quality of life."

Financial Implications

It is estimated that appropriate support for developing the shadow SNTB and the overarching Transport Strategy would total £200,000 of which KCC's contribution is £20,000.

Legal Implications

There are no direct legal implications of the recommendations in this report, although

should an TfSE SNTB be established by the Secretary of the State following the work set out in this report, then there would be legal implications arising from the establishment of the SNTB which itself would be a body corporate.

Equalities implications

There are no equality implications to establish the Shadow TfSE

Under Key Decision 13/00080, a visitor economy services contract was awarded to Visit Kent at £280,000 per annum, for three years with an option to extend for a further three years to March 2020. Under the terms of the current contract, the County Council also agreed to provide additional staff and financial resources to support visit Kent's activities. The contract requires Visit Kent to develop and deliver innovation and creative solutions to grow the Kent visitor economy, and to support KCC's priorities for the sector which are to:

- Promote the county to target visitor markets, and to increase the numbers of visitors to Kent and the value of visitor spend;
- Support growth in the Kent visitor economy;
- Provide high quality support to the Kent tourism business sector;
- Improve the skills levels of employees within Kent's visitor economy; and
- Attract additional public and private sector investment.

Policy context

The proposed decision is consistent with the following outcomes in KCC's Strategic Statement ('increasing Opportunities, Improving Outcomes):

- Kent communities feel the benefits of economic growth by being in work, healthy and enjoying a good quality of life (Strategic Outcome);
- Kent business growth is supported by having access to a well skilled workforce (Supported Outcome);
- All Kent's communities benefit from economic growth and lower levels of deprivation (Supporting Outcome); and
- Kent residents enjoy a good quality of life and more people benefit from greater social, cultural and sporting opportunities.

Financial implications

The value of the County Council's contract with Visit Kent for the period April 2017 to March 2018 would be £410,000. This would comprise the main contract (maintained at £280,000), staff resources seconded to Visit Kent (approximately £30,000) and a one-off financial contribution to support externally funded projects in support of the visitor economy (£100,000).

16/00148 A2 Bean and Ebbsfleet Junction Improvement - funding contribution by the Strategic Transport Infrastructure Programme (STP)

The Kent Thameside Strategic Transport Infrastructure Programme (STiP) is a package of improvements that respond to assessments of the individual impacts and mitigation measures for significant development across the boroughs of Dartford and Gravesham. A Key Decision was taken on 21 February 2008 (decision no 07/01108) agreeing to the County Council acting as the Accountable Body for the programme.

The programme aims to provide key transport infrastructure improvements that would enable the planned level of development in Kent Thameside to be realised. Ultimately, the development will result in some 22,600 new homes and around 1 million m2 of commercial development with the potential for 60,000 jobs. The programme would be largely funded through a combination of public sector grants and private sector contributions.

Since the original decision was taken there have been considerable changes to the progress of developments and the available funding. This has resulted in a reduction in the then assumed funding levels reported in 2012 which were circa £84m down to £70m and an increase in projected scheme costs from £116m in 2012 to £169m today.

This is largely from increased to the Bean and Ebbsfleet scheme of £45m and £7.5m for Dartford Town Centre. It is worth noting that the whole cost of the Bean and Ebbsfleet Scheme was included in the costing summary in 2012 and this equated to £80m. Considering that the STIP fund is only required to make a reasonable contribution (from S106 monies) and whilst the overall scheme costs may have increased to £125m the STIP fund is not required to cover the full amount.

Financial implications – scheme

As the Accountable Body for the programme, the County Council is responsible for the management of the programme and administration of funding received. A dedicated Programme Investment Fund has been set up within the County Councils corporate financial system and consists of the following funds and potential sources of funding:

- 13m Homes and Communities Agency Grant received and held in the account.
- 12.7m Local Growth Fund scheme specific allocations/approvals high confidence that this will all be approved.
- 5.1m New Homes Bonus (application is unlikely to be successful)/.

There are further amounts available to the fund by way of S106 monies and in the case of Dartford, potential CIL moneys which are subject to Member approval.

These amounts equate to

- £1,862,286m secured and received in the fund.
- £1,521,452m secured and held by the District Councils
- £31,025,550m secured but not received (Incl EQ).
- £2m subject to negotiation.

There are also additional S106,CIL monies identified that are either not secured, subject to lapsed permissions or development is not progressed which amounts to a further £10,275,820.

The total sum that would be available to the overall fund, assuming all elements could be confidently accounted for is £77,485,108.

However, applying a RAG status to all potential funds and removing the high risk/low confidence values, results in a potential STIP fund of £62,109,288. A summary of the above funding is attached in Appendix B.

Options

There is a requirement for the STIP fund to make a reasonable contribution to the A2 Bean scheme. The business case for the scheme is dependent on an acceptable level of private funding and a figure of £25m has been offered as a full and final contribution. In deciding this course of action, two options were considerate based on the above funding analysis:

- 3) A minimal contribution whereby an apportionment exercise is undertaking a percentage of each S106 (bearing in mind the pooling restrictions) in relation to the overall scheme cost and directing these monies to the project.
- 4) Direct to the Eastern Quarry S106 funds on £24.7m to the Project in their entirety as it is geographically adjacent to both the Bean and Ebbsfleet junctions plus an additional £300k from S106 monies.

A meeting of the lead STIP Members discussed these options and it was agreed that the most reasonably solution was to support option 2. This offer represents a pragmatic solution to the funding request, is easier to administer and fits within the leve3l of funding that has been identified as potentially available with the highest level of confidence.

A third option would be to not contribute any monies to the scheme and force the issue back

to DfT but this course of action would:

- d) Make the scheme unaffordable
- e) Have an adverse affect on the development plans for the area.
- f) Not be in line with previous agreements and commitments to funding contributions.

Financial implications

There are no financial implications to KCC. There is no provision for underwriting the monies nor is there the availability to forward fund. This has been conveyed to both HE and DfT and KCC has explained that the amounts can only be collected as and when the various triggers are met for the development. Therefore, the risk associated to the funding profile rests with HE and DfT. A profile for the Eatern Quarry S106 funds is contained in the attached letter from the Cabinet Member for Economic Development to DfT (Appendix A) and a summary table of the STIP funds as currently stands in Appendix B.

This submission seeks to ensure full compliance with Kent County Council governance for the award of the Young Carers Service contract. This service is currently providing support to children and young people and Kent County Council is paying for this service; the report is to satisfy the governance arrangements for this contract.

The Council has a statutory obligation to provide for support for young carers; under the

Children and Families Act 2014 and the Care Act 2014, Local Authorities must 'take reasonable steps to identify the extent to which there are young carers within their area who have needs for support' and are responsible for 'assessing whether a young carer within their area has needs for support and, if so, what those needs are'.

The Early Help Commissioning Intentions for 2016/17 recognise that a new Young Carers Service could play a critical role in strengthening open access services and support for young people, thereby reducing demand for more intensive, specialist and costly services.

The Early Help and Preventative Services Commissioning Intentions for 201617 were approved via the following governance route:

- Portfolio Board 25 June 2015;
- CAB 22 July 2015 & September 2015;
- DIVMT Various;
- Education Cabinet Committee 18 September 2015;
- Corporate Board 28 September 2015; and
- Full Cabinet Committee 12 October 2015.

The Procurement Plan for the Young Carers Service was agreed at Procurement Board on 25 November 2015 (Appendix 2). The procurement route was an open tender exercise. As the required service can be categorised under Schedule 3 of the Public Contracts Regulations 2015 and as the value of the required service does exceed the higher threshold of €750,000 (£589,148 sterling equivalent), the Council had to advertise the opportunity on the Official Journal of the European Union ('OJEU').

Following an open tender procurement exercise, the authority to award the Young Carers Service contract was delegated to Peter Oakford as Cabinet Member for Specialist Children's Services. However this decision was outside of the Education and Young Peoples Services Cabinet Committee and therefore a formal record of the decision to delegate authority to Peter Oakford is not available.

Financial implications

The total lifetime (i.e. 36 + 12 months) value of the contract is £1,316,550.73.

Budget savings were not attached to this contract in recognition of the need for a service with additional capacity to provide workforce development as well as direct support to young carers to ensure Kent County Council remains in compliance with the legislative requirement within the Care Act 2014 and the Children's and Families Act 2014 to "take reasonable steps to identify the

extent to which there are young carers within their area who have needs for support" and "assessing whether a young carer has needs for support, and if so what those needs are".

Kent County Council has a statutory responsibility as defined within the Care Act 2014 and the Children and Families Act 2014 to "take reasonable steps to identify the extent to which there are young carers within their area who have needs for support" and "assessing whether a young carer has needs for support, and if so what those needs are".

The contractor is continuing to deliver the Young Carers Service as per the contract and is being paid by Kent County Council accordingly. However the Young Carers Service contract remains unsealed and in order to protect both the contractor and the Council action is required to enable the legal sealing of the contract.

Equalities Implications

An Equalities Impact Assessment has been undertaken and it has determined that awarding the Young Carers Service contract would have a low impact on service users with protected characteristics.

Of particular note is that housing also includes housing related support or services.

Financial Implications: The current value of these contracts is £2,973,950.96 per annum.

Background

The current contract expires 31 December 2017. Extension options have been considered by the Strategic Commissioning Board. However, these options are not viable in this instance as the incumbent supplier is unable to continue. Accordingly, in order to ensure a seamless service remains in place a new procurement is required which has the flexibility to accommodate devolution and enable local councils to opt in or out of the contract moving forward. Ongoing procurement with appropriate economies of scale enable market testing and ensures that the rates KCC pay for the work are competitive and reflective of the current market.

Options

The commissioning of all work streams within the soft landscape service was considered and agreed by the Strategic Commissioning Board on 4 July 2016. A broad range of commissioning solutions were debated and the extension of the current contract was preferred.

However, the incumbent supplier is unable to continue. Therefore, the re-procurement of the urban grass shrubs and hedges service (Maidstone, Dartford, Canterbury and Thanet) will now be bought forward to ensure a seamless flexible service remains in place.

How the proposed decision meets the objectives of 'increasing opportunities, improving outcomes: KCC's Strategic Statement 15-20'

The urban grass shrubs and hedges service is a discretionary service that keeps Kent's Roads moving and assists economic growth.

Financial implications

The annual spend is estimated at £325k per annum and will continue to be funded from the soft landscape budget. The proposed contract length will be five years with an option to extend the contract for up to a further two years, on a one plus one basis. Should KCC decide to run the contract for the full term (seven years), including extensions the total expenditure is estimated at £2,275,000.

Impacts / Costs and risks of proposed decisions:

The transport strategies to be agreed all form part a key part of evidence base for the relevant Local Plan. These plans will be subject to and examination in public by and independent planning inspector during 2015. The appropriateness and deliverability of each strategy will be an important consideration in the inspector's decision on the soundness of the Plan as a whole.

The delivery of each transport strategy will be heavily dependent on securing funding contributions from development through the section 106 and Community Infrastructure Levy (CIL) processes, as KCC's Local Transport Plan funding allocation from Central Government is

likely to be under sustained pressure from the foreseeable future. KCC will not be the charging authority therefore it will be reliant on each local council as the planning authority to allocate sufficient CIL revenue to the priority transport infrastructure projects identified in the strategy. The availability of CIL revenue will in turn be dictated by the phasing and extent of new development which will be influenced by a range of external factors.

Update 09/03/2015:

DEFERRED: The disposals team at KCC are currently working on new plans for the site in order to ensure that the maximum value is secured; surveys are being carried out with a view to marketing the site in the future dependent on the outcome of those surveys.

Latest Update:

19/05/2014: Decision due date changed from 23/12/2013 to 'Not before' 01/11/2014. REASON: The disposals team at KCC are currently working on new plans for the site in order to ensure that the maximum value for the site is secured. Options appraisal work is underway and this work is expected to take approx. 6 months, therefore an expected decision date is set for November.

To seek approval to proceed with the disposal of the above site to raise a capital receipt which will be allocated to support the capital programme.

To seek approval to identify and progress with the acquisition of a new site for the service.

The Director of Property and Infrastructure Support will be authorised to finalise terms for both the disposal and acquisition of a new site.

This decision is needed to enable a modern highway service operation to be provided in the East Kent Area that is both reactive and responsive to changing demands. It directly supports 3 of the Bold Steps for Kent.

- Firstly it helps deliver the "Kent Environment Strategy" by the provision of new environmentally friendly facilities (e.g. grey water) via the construction technique with the eventual adaptation of new work practices within the new depot.
- Secondly it builds relations with key business sectors across Kent as the supply chain involved in such a project provides work to businesses of all sizes.
- Thirdly by the better siting and provision of facilities for the new depot it ensures that the most robust and effective public protection arrangements are in place for road management including bad weather response.

The impact of the decision is that full assessment of the potential disposal of the site can be explored within the market place to ensure that best value principles are adhered to. In tandem a full search and feasibility study will be undertaken to identify a new location for the alternative highways depot which satisfies the above objectives.

LATEST UPDATE:

REASON: The decision remains at the earliest stages of investigation and options appraisal. A further review will take place in January 2015 when a decision pathway will be identified and the proposed decision updated further.

To seek agreement to the principle of granting a long lease to a charitable community interest company or similar vehicle, of The Eden Centre, Four Elms Road, Edenbridge.

The proposal directly links to Bold Steps for Kent, putting the citizen in control, building new partnerships and providing a new fit for purpose building to deliver Library and FSC services in conjunction with other partners such as the Citizen's Advice Bureau and House (West Kent Action), to support Kent's more vulnerable citizens.

The impact of the decision will be that KCC will have less control of the management and operation of the centre as they would become the responsibility of a third party.

Risks identified are:

- Reliance on the professionalism of the trustees to deliver a successful facility, agreeing with all partners a financial model for the charitable vehicle
- Reputational damage to KCC if the charitable vehicle were to fail
- Obtaining buy in from all community groups in occupation to form trust

- Untried and untested model
- Level of income generation from the centre which could go to the charitable vehicle is currently unknown as a new facility
- Continued KCC ownership of a non-core asset
- Officers may be unable to get agreement from stakeholders, charitable vehicle does not prove financially sustainable or the trust may break down and charitable vehicle will have to pick up void periods and associated costs (benefit to KCC).
