# Brief description of policy, procedure, project or service

The main activities of the Service are to provide expert historic environment planning advice to Kent County Council, Medway Council, districts and others; to maintain the Historic Environment Record as the main data source for decision-making; to manage KCC's eight historic windmills; to deliver the Portable Antiquities Scheme in Kent and to promote involvement of communities in archaeology and the wider historic environment. The Service aims to:

- Provide archaeological planning advice (over 2,000 applications per year) to KCC, Medway Council, Ebbsfleet
  Development Corporation, Kent's Districts (except Canterbury) and others, including the setting or agreeing of
  specifications for archaeological work and the monitoring of their implementation
- Manage and enhance the Kent Historic Environment Record (a computerised database with information on almost 90,000 heritage assets and features, with c. 300-400 records added each year) as required in the National Planning Policy Framework
- Develop historic environment policy particularly in relation to the implications of development
- Promote the role of the historic environment in regeneration, particularly in the growth areas
- Provide historic built environment planning advice to KCC
- Provide advice on archaeological work in connection with KCC road schemes
- Manage, maintain and safeguard KCC's eight historic windmills, in partnership with KCC Infrastructure and volunteer windmill groups, as owner of last resort

- Manage the Portable Antiquities Scheme and assist with the Treasure process in Kent; average of 100 records added per month and over 60 Treasure cases in 2018
- Promote access to Kent's heritage through projects such as Cobham Landscape Detectives, Shorne Wood HubCAP, Fifth Continent Landscape Partnership Scheme and others
- Increase awareness of the historic environment by ensuring significant discoveries are exhibited and brought to the attention of local people where possible, seeking funding through Section 106 agreements e.g. as at Chilmington Green, Ashford

In October 2019 a paper was submitted to the Environment & Transport Cabinet Committee on the subject 'Heritage Service: current priorities and future strategy'. The paper stated that a strategy for the Heritage Conservation Service will be prepared on the basis of the priorities and work of the team. This strategy is now in preparation and is to be accompanied by this EqIA. It is envisaged that the strategy will go to public consultation in due course. Following the completion of the strategy, individual components of the service will need their own EqIAs as new initiatives and projects are brought forward.

# **Aims and Objectives**

The aims of the project are to develop a strategy for the team that :

- 1. reviews Kent's historic environment
- 2. identifies key recent highlights for the service
- 3. presents the policy background for the team's work
- 4. sets out a Vision and high-level strategic aims with medium term issues and key objectives for each
- 5. identifies desired outcomes for the service
- 6. commits to developing an implementation plan

# **Analysis**

The analysis bellow is drawn primarily from Heritage Counts 2021 and related research.

# Age

Younger and older groups are less likely to visit a heritage site. In a DCMS survey the age groups of 16-24 and 75+ had less respondents reporting that they had visited a heritage site in the last 12 months (60-63%) compared to other age groups (74-78%). A similar trend was seen in 2018/19, but in 2019/20, no difference in participation between the age groups 16-24 and 75+ was seen (DCMS 2020). Volunteering - a 2012 paper by Mohan and Bulloch suggested that 41% of people in core volunteering groups were over the age of 50. The Charities Aid Foundation reported in 2013 that 33% of the core was aged over 65. The ageing of this civic core has prompted some concerns over the likely outlook for volunteering in the years to come. Age UK (2018) "Our research shows a clear link between participation [in creative and cultural activities] and wellbeing"

This suggests that although there are clear benefits to older people being involved in heritage, the volunteer resource that often enables such involvements is aging. In addition younger and older people are less able/willing to visit heritage sites.

### Disability

17 % of people who had not visited a heritage site in 2019/20 identified disability or illness as a factor (DCMS 2020). Volunteering the proportions of disabled and non-disabled people who participated in volunteering were similar – this was true for both formal and informal volunteering. In the year ending March 2018, 37.7% of disabled people had taken part in formal volunteering in the previous 12 months compared with 41.9% of non-disabled people. For informal volunteering, 56.9% of disabled people participated compared with 53.5% of non-disabled people (ONS).

This suggests that disabled people are as enthusiastic about volunteering as other groups but sometimes find it difficult to visit heritage sites.

#### Sex

Historic England's 'Pride of Place' initiative (2016) has highlighted the range of heritage structures that help tell the story of England's LGBTQ community, the degree to which these are under-represented in HERs, and has suggested ways that recording initiatives (eg in HERs) can be developed to address the imbalance.

#### Gender

A greater proportion of volunteers in the Sport and Heritage sectors were men than women in 2017-18. In Heritage, 67% of volunteers were male and 33% were female (DCMS Community Life Survey and Taking Part Survey 2017-18).

#### Race

Engagement with heritage varies widely between young people from different ethnic groups. Young people of Black Caribbean origin had relatively low levels of heritage engagement (39%) compared with a higher level for white young people (59%) (Lakey et al (2017) 'Culture, Sport and Wellbeing'). In terms visiting heritage sites a significant gap exists between the participation rates of people with ethnicities described as White (75.3% participation), Asian (59.5%) and Black (41.1%), compared with an overall average of 73% (DCMS 2020, Heritage Taking Part Survey 2019/20).

### Religion and Belief

It is generally recognised that traditional heritage practices in the UK have neglected non-Christian and non-religious audiences, their areas of interest and related heritage structures. Precise statistics on this are lacking though. There are good exemplar projects for recording the structures of different faith groups (eg Shaheen (2018)' The British Mosque: An architectural and social history' and Kadish (2015) Jewish Heritage in Britain and Ireland.
