### **Aims and Objectives**

Kent County Council (KCC) has outsourced the service known as Connecting Adoptive Families Independent Service (CAFIS) for more than 10 years. The services encompass a range of independent adoption support services. Delivering these services is a statutory requirement and they are underpinned by a comprehensive specialised legislative framework.

The current contract for this service is due to end on 30 September 2023.

The specification for the proposed new service is currently being developed with key stakeholders.

The aim of the activity is to commission and re-tender for the Regional Adoption Agency (RAA) a contract for Independent Adoption support services from 1 October 2023, ensuring equal access to all eligible birth parents, adopted children, adult adoptees adoptive parents and birth families and that there are no restrictions based on protected characteristics.

Service Objectives are as follows:-

### 1. Statutory Obligations

Ensure that our strategic partner delivers our statutory obligations regarding the provision of birth parent counselling, access to birth records and intermediary services and ensuring that family time is protected,

promoted, and delivered as per agreed Contact Plans.

### 2. Manage Risk Effectively

To identify, assess, control, and monitor risks and opportunities associated with the re-commissioning of the services.

### 3. Improve Outcomes

To meet the needs of children, birth families, adoptive parents and adopted adults and all those who are subject to or who are affected by Adoption.

The re-tendering of the Independent Adoption Support Services through a procurement exercise will offer the opportunity to build on lessons learnt from the previous contracts and improve the overall service offering.

The aim of the activity is to ensure service users are accessing advice and support in a safe and secure way as well as ensuring the statutory duties of Kent County Council are fulfilled in an open and transparent manner.

In 2014 a change in legislation extended the provision of intermediary services to facilitate contact between persons with a prescribed relationship. This is defined as individuals who still have a relationship with the adoptee by blood, marriage, or civil partnership.

Service users who present with life limiting conditions and terminal diagnosis are prioritised and additional support and appointments are offered to ensure a timely completion of the case.
