Context

Sellindge Primary School is a popular and successful school, rated Outstanding by Ofsted. The proposal is in line with KCC's expectation of providing local schools for primary aged children wherever possible, having a positive impact on local families.

There is housing growth in Sellindge Village with a total of 250 dwellings planned for the area.

KCC have asked Sellindge Primary School to expand from 0.5 Form of Entry (FE) to 1FE. The proposal is to add 15 Reception Year places each year from September 2017; a total of 105 additional places by 2022.

Aims and Objectives

The project is to provide additional school places in an area identified as needing additional places due to proposed housing development.

The developer and land owners are yet to agree the land price. Therefore, the development has not commenced. As the expansion of Sellindge Primary School is linked to the development and the receipt of land and contributions, the planned expansion will now not able to proceed until September 2020 at the earliest.

The Equality Impact Assessment has been reviewed in light of the request to delay the expansion. There are forecast to be sufficient primary aged places in the planning area for 2018-19 and 2019-20, therefore no amendments have been needed.
